Rabbi's Corner Joel Nickerson

Spring is quickly approaching, and even if we don't see the evidence in our natural surroundings, we can hear it in the sound of the groggers and smell of hamentaschen. The special and exciting holiday of Purim falls on the 14th of Adar and begins our spring lineup of holidays, which include Passover and Shavuot. It is a holiday whose joy overwhelms our senses and whose message tells of our struggle and success in a history full of oppression and deception. We dress up in silly costumes, eat food in the shape of Haman's hat, make a lot of noise, and read a story in our canon which includes jokes and ridiculous characters (by the way, I think King Ahashuerus is the most ridiculous).

However, there is one important piece that is missing from *Megillat Esther* (the 'scroll of Esther') from which we read on Purim. Nowhere in the entire story is God mentioned. God is seemingly absent from this story of persecution and eventual freedom. How contrary to the Exodus narrative in which God is given center stage! While some commentators say that God is found in the root of Esther's name ('to hide'), this concept of a hidden God adds an element of modernity to the Purim story. So much of our canon puts God at the center, with the characters of our narrative speaking directly with God, in conversation with God. Yet in the Purim story, we find a connection with God that is similar to our current state – God is not easily accessible or willing to intervene on our behalf (at least not directly). God is hidden and we struggle to connect to God. And, we live in a world focused on some of the very same things found in the story of Purim – parties, politics, beauty, and acceptance.

Therefore, I urge you this month to explore your understanding and definition of God. Rachel Adler, my teacher, gave me the following questions to explore on my own and I hope they are as helpful to you in defining your understanding of God as they have been for me. Spend some time thinking about your own answers and maybe even create a dialogue with your family and friends. It is my hope that we continually try to bring God out of hiding and into our day-today living.

- 1. What do you believe about the immanence (existing in all aspects of our world) and/or transcendence (above and outside our world) of God?
- 2. Is God a source of revelation? In what way?
- 3. Is God a personality or a process?
- 4. What do you believe about divine power? Is it limited or total?
- 5. Does God communicate with human beings? If so, how?
- 6. Are individuals significant to God?
- 7. What is the connection between God and the Jewish community?
- 8. Does it matter to God how human beings behave? Does God hold people accountable?
- 9. Does God intervene in history?
- 10. Is God attentive to prayer?
- 11. Is God capable of change? If so, how can God be considered perfect?
- 12. What does it mean to be b'tzelem elohim (made in the image of God)?

Dr. Meier was one of the signatories for the purchase of our building on Malabar Avenue and he rejoiced with all of us when the mortgage was fully repaid. Our heartfelt condolences go to Annette and to his children, Arthur, Joshua, Adam and Amy. Leon will be missed as a congregant and as a dear friend.
