President's Message Ruth Hartman

Dear Congregation Shir Ami Members and Friends,

This month, some news about upcoming happenings at Shir Ami.

The long-awaited arrival of the new Reform siddur/prayerbook, *Mishkan T'filah*. Shir Ami purchased 80 copies of this beautiful, contemporary, gender-inclusive, fully transliterated Shabbat and festival liturgy. We expect to receive our volumes in November and begin using them for our worship services. I have had the opportunity to use the new siddur a few times, and it offers wonderful new depths of reflection, poetry, scholarship, and inspiration. Several members and friends helped us to pay the deposit on these books in 2002 by purchasing dedications. However, about half the books are still available for dedication. This is a lasting and meaningful way to honor a special occasion or the memory of a loved one. Please see the flier in this bulletin, fill it out and return it to make your dedications.

New Adult Education class, *Taste of Judaism*, starting Saturday, November 10, 2-4 pm. This three-session class, led by Rabbinic interns Carla Fenves and Bekah Stern, will offer an introduction to Jewish beliefs, values, and community. The class is open to all, whether Jewish or not, whether Shir Ami members or not. It's ideal for parents raising Jewish children and for anyone who wants to deepen or refresh their understanding of Judaism. The classes are free but registration is required. Rabbis' Corner Bekah Stern Carla Fenves

Dear Congregation Shir Ami members and friends,

Disaster can strike at any moment. It doesn't seem so long ago that many of our own Bay Area friends and neighbors were evacuated from their homes in the Oakland fire of 1991. Many lost their homes. Many didn't have time to rescue their precious and irreplaceable belongings before they fled for their lives. To this day, when we look east from the Bay toward the Oakland/Berkeley hills, we can still trace the path of the hungry flames.

I write to you from a Southern California that is charred, smoking, and in some places, still burning. Hundreds of thousands of acres have burned. Half a million people were evacuated. It is still unclear just how many thousands of homes have been destroyed. Several people have died. Billions of dollars will be spent before the rebuilding and cleanup efforts are complete. For a frame of reference, the Oakland Hills fire of 1991 burned only 1,520 acres and caused an economic loss estimated at \$1.5 billion.

But there is good news too. Perhaps because residents of the entire Southern California area have been affected by the unseasonable and uncomfortable weather; or perhaps because all residents within an area hundreds of miles wide have seen the sun rise and set orange in a smoky sky and have felt our eyes burning and lungs tightening due to the ash in the air; whatever the reason, the shelters had so many people volunteering their time and bringing food to donate to the evacuees that they had to turn volunteers and donations away at the door. The outpouring of support from communities more distant from the flames has been tremendous. But this does not mean that the opportunities for giving have passed.

Leviticus 19:18 reads, "V'ahavta l'reiacha kamochah—you shall love your fellow as yourself." Here is the biblical source of what is more commonly referred to as the Golden Rule. If we put ourselves in the place of the people who have been devastated by the fires of the last week, what would we want from our communities? How would we want to be supported? What would we need? As they turned volunteers and donations away, the shelters told the would-be givers that at this point what is most needed is cash.

As givers, this is sometimes the last thing we want to give. It feels impersonal. We'd rather give something that marks our donation as coming from us. Money is anonymous. But right now, money is exactly what's needed. On Sunday mornings in our religious school we teach our children the value of *tzedakah*. *Tzedakah* is commonly translated as meaning charity, or alms. But the root of the word is *tzedek*, which means justice or righteousness. As Jews, we recognize the connection between charitable giving, and restoring balance to an unjust situation. Of course, there are other things we can do to help prevent future disasters like this one. The experts agree that the conditions that fanned the flames this week in Southern California were the result of the climate changes that our behavior has caused. In making the necessary changes to our daily lives to reduce our environmental impact on this earth, we can make a long-lasting difference. Though he certainly did not understand the breadth of his words, Smokey the Bear said it best, "Only you can prevent wildfires."

The Israel Corner

Featured Location *Tel Aviv*/Old *Jaffa*



On the 4th day of our Israel trip we'll visit Tel Aviv, AKA the Big Apple of Israel. Tel Aviv is a modern, mostly secular, coastal big city, complete with sky scrapers! But a mere 60 years ago, Tel Aviv was a sandy backwater beach town. We'll make a stop at Independence Hall, where on May 14th 1948 Israel's first Prime Minister David Ben Gurion delivered Israel's Declaration of the Establishment of the State of Israel. The photos above show

Independence Hall as it was almost 60 years ago on that momentous day, and as it is today—virtually unchanged.

We will also wander the cobbled alleyways of Old Jaffa (above), the small port city that was nearly swallowed by the construction of Tel Aviv! Jaffa is so old that it is mentioned by name as a port city in the Hebrew Bible.

Featured Writing

An excerpt from Israel's Declaration of the Establishment of the State of Israel, delivered May 14, 1948

The land of Israel was the birthplace of the Jewish people. Here their spiritual, religious and political identity was shaped. Here they first experienced statehood, created cultural values of national and universal significance and gave to the world the eternal Book of Books.

After being forcibly exiled from their land, the people kept faith with it throughout their dispersion and never ceased to pray and hope for their return to it and for the restoration in it of their political freedom.

Impelled by this historic and traditional attachment, Jews strove in every successive generation to re-establish themselves in their ancient homeland. In recent decades they

returned in their masses. Pioneers, ma'pilim [immigrants coming to Israel in defiance of restrictive legislation] and defenders, they made deserts bloom, revived the Hebrew language, built villages and towns, and created a thriving community



controlling its own economy and culture, loving peace but knowing how to defend itself, bringing the blessings of progress to all the country's inhabitants, and aspiring towards independent nationhood...

There are a couple of events upcoming for school families that I would like to mention. First, on November 9th our rabbinic intern, Carla Fenves, will be conducting a Shabbat service geared specifically for families with young children. The content of the service will be child friendly, as well as the length of the service, about 30-40 minutes. The time of the service, 6 p.m., has also been set in the hopes of allowing families with young children to attend. Following the children's service at 6:45 we will be having a potluck dinner for the entire congregation. As a mother of three children, I am a very low pressure Religious School Director. I **know** how busy you all are. I'm stepping out of my comfort zone to really encourage families to try out this special Shabbat service.

Second, is our Sunday School Chanukah Party on December 9th. As our synagogue president, Ruth Hartman, has been saying in her column, it is important for each member family in Shir Ami to reach out to friends and neighbors to introduce them to our great little synagogue. Our school is going strong (see update below), but it would be nice to have a few more kids to round out our classes. The upcoming Sunday School Chanukah party will be a great opportunity to bring friends to a very kid-friendly event. This party will be held on Sunday, December 9th starting at 10:30 am. Mark your calendars and let your friends know so that they can come. I'm interested in any advice you might have on ways to publicize this event.

Finally, a little update on what our classes are doing. In our preschool class, the emphasis is on art, music, food and fun. This year the kids have decorated pumpkins for our Sukkah, and created their own storybooks telling the creation story. In the K-1 religious school class, the students are introduced to the holidays, to Torah, to tzedakah and to mitzvot and these are presented with music and art projects. For example, as part of the introduction to Torah, the students made their own Torahs. Today, when I walked through they were cutting cloth covers for them, and talking about making crowns. In the 2^{nd} - 3^{rd} grade class they really focus on the joy of Judaism. I've seen learning take place through art projects and amazing conversation. The kids are asking such intriguing questions that the rabbinic interns need to be called in to respond. In the 4^{th} – 5^{th} grade class the kids designed their own architectural Sukkahs, and have been studying communities. In the 6^{th} - 7^{th} grade class, the students are presently learning in depth about the twelve tribes of Israel. It turns out that the breast plate of one of our Torahs depicts these twelve tribes. In the confirmation class, the students are learning conversational Hebrew and some of the elements necessary to define their own levels of observance and beliefs for their Judaism.

"Finding the Strength to Fight Our Fears" from Weekend Edition Sunday, October 14, 2007 by Terry Ahwal

When I was 11 years old and living under the Israeli occupation, I took a chance and after curfew I ran to visit my grandmother who lived two blocks away from us. On the road, I had to hide under a truck to avoid soldiers who were coming my way. For 20 minutes I lay there in utter fear watching their boots walk back and forth in front of the truck. My heart was pounding so fast and loud that I was afraid one of the soldiers would hear it...

To calm myself,... I remembered the words of my mother... She told us to put our fear and anger aside and pray for the poor soldiers, who were also afraid because they were away from their homes in Israel.

I began to feel bad for the soldiers. I wondered: Where do they sleep and are they afraid of little children like me? What kind of food do they eat? Do they have big or small families? Their voices began to remind me of my neighbors. My fear dissipated a bit as I pictured the soldiers as people I knew. Although my 20 minutes under the truck seemed like an eternity, I believe that shedding my fear literally saved my life.

Thirty-six years later...

After Sept. 11, the Arab and Muslim community segregated themselves because of the level of suspicion directed at them from others. Fear of association because of ethnicity led many to retreat within themselves and their community. They stopped socializing with non-Arab/Muslim colleagues and neighbors. Once again, we allow differences to separate us because of fear.

I believe it is fear we should be fighting not the "other." We all belong to the same human tribe; that kinship supersedes our differences. We are all soldiers patrolling the road, and we're all little children hiding under the truck.
