President's Message Ruth Hartman

Dear Congregation Shir Ami Members and Friends,

I was raised in an unaffiliated home. Both my parents are Jewish, but we never belonged to a synagogue or any other Jewish organization. My sisters and I never attended a Jewish summer camp, and we were often among just a small handful of Jewish children in our schools. Our Jewish identity was defined more by being different than by any larger sense of belonging.

But in spite of their aversion to organized religion, my parents did try to communicate a sense of pride in being Jewish. Every year my mother would come to school with a menorah and tell the Hanukkah story to my classmates. And when my children were in elementary school in Castro Valley, I did the same, as I know many of you did and still do.

Even though it deals with a violent battle against forced assimilation, the Hanukkah story is somehow universal and very appealing. I think it's the message of hope, of the determined few prevailing against the powerful many, of light in a dark time. It's the growing brightness as we count the nights, the spirit of play, and the simplicity of the celebration.

At Shir Ami, we have two Hanukkah events every year. On Friday evening (December 7 this year, starting at 6:30 pm) we have our Hanukkah potluck supper. Each family brings their Hanukkiah and lights it on the table. Our school children are preparing to lead us in the candle blessings this year, and to sing a few Hanukkah songs for us before our 8 pm Shabbat service. During that evening's service, we'll be welcoming and honoring the five new members, both singles and families, who have joined Shir Ami since this time last year. Then on Sunday, December 9, we'll have our annual Religious School Hanukkah party, complete with latkes, edible dreidels and fun Hanukkah crafts. I hope you'll join us for these celebrations, and bring your friends and neighbors to share in the warmth of Hanukkah.

Happy Hanukkah to you, and thank you for helping me and my family find the sense of Jewish belonging that I missed as a child,

Rabbis' Corner Bekah Stern Carla Fenves

Dear Congregation Shir Ami members and friends,

As Jews approach the darkest days of the years, we celebrate Chanukah, the Festival of Lights. We light the menorah's candles and create *or* (light) in memory of the miracle of the jug of oil that burned in the Temple for eight days. That jug of oil not only lit the Temple over two thousand years ago, but it continues to shine and inspire us today.

Light is a powerful symbol in Judaism. For example, in a recent "Taste of Judaism" class, a participant brought up the concept of *or l'goyim* a light among the nations. We read in Isaiah 42:6-7: "I have called you in righteousness, and have taken hold of your hand, and kept you, and set you for a covenant of the people, for a light among the nations. To open the eyes of the blind, to bring the prisoners out from the dungeon and to bring those who sit in darkness out of the prison-house." God's covenant with the Jewish people demands that we pursue justice in the world. In this prophetic text, being a light among the nations means modeling holy work.

What does it mean for us as Jews today to be a light among the nations? How can we work to kindle our world's light? Rabbis usually love to jump to all of the metaphorical meanings behind this biblical phrase, but in this case let us take a moment to literally translate the concept into modern terms. We have the power to physically bring light into the world by replacing our old incandescent bulbs with new compact fluorescent bulbs. The fluorescent bulbs are four times more efficient and can last eight times longer. They reduce energy consumption and the electric bill.

Just as the Maccabees rededicated the Temple in Jerusalem, we can rededicate our planet's energy. Just as they made the oil last for eight days, we can make our light bulbs last eight times longer. May we be blessed with renewable light that can be passed down *l'dor v'dor* from generation to generation.

In the renewed effort that began this week to reach a lasting peace agreement between Israel and her neighbors, the region known as the Golan Heights will surely be discussed. Israel has governed the area that it eventually annexed since the Six Day War of 1967. The region is in the northeast of the county and is dotted with picturesque farms on green rolling hills. It looks a lot like Northern California! In April we'll hike to the Jilaboun Waterfall (above), spend some time exploring some of the area's archeological finds, and meet soldiers serving on Israel's northern border with Lebanon.

Jan has also been a great help to our Shir Ami teens - facilitating their work with the chugim art projects.
