#### Rabbis' Corner Bekah Stern Carla Fenves

Dear Congregation Shir Ami members and friends,

Next week will mark the beginning of the month of Adar. Unfortunately, for those of us who associate Adar with the celebration of Purim, we are going to have to wait another month before pulling out costumes and baking hamentaschen. During a leap year such as this one in the Jewish calendar, there are two months of Adar—Adar alef and Adar bet or Adar 1 and Adar 2—and Purim takes place during the second month.

Although it dictates much of our Jewish life, from when to light Hanukah candles to a bar mitzvah's Torah portion, many of us know very little about the Jewish calendar. The Hebrew Bible formed the original core of the calendar by marking events such as revelation at Sinai. The Babylonian exile then gave shape to the system with the adoption of the names for months and the lunisolar calendar.

Originally, the sighting of a new moon determined when a new month began. (The Jewish day, therefore, begins at sundown rather than midnight.) While we still preserve this tradition by symbolically identifying the new moon with various Rosh Hodesh rituals, the calendar today is based on a series of lunisolar formulas. For instance, an entire extra month, Adar 2, is added every two to three years to ensure that the calendar remains seasonal and we do not celebrate Sukkot in the cold of February. In contrast, the Islamic calendar is based purely on a lunar calendar with no intercalary month, so observance of Ramadan is not associated with a particular time of year.

Since Purim is celebrated in Adar 2 during a leap year, Adar 1 is left with no significant Jewish moments. It functions as a placeholder in the Jewish calendar while we wait for the excitement of the upcoming Purim and Passover. The only occasion marked on the calendar is Purim Katan, Little Purim, which has no set observances. It is in essence a reminder or dress rehearsal for the month to come.

Rather than bemoan the lack of activity on the Jewish calendar during Adar 1, I hope we can take this time to prepare ourselves for the upcoming festivities. Spend a little more time putting together that Esther costume or planning your Passover seder menu. Release a sigh of relief over the regularity of the Shabbat and Religious School schedules. Truly relish the added rest in Jewish time.

The rain held off for some outdoor Tu B'Shevat events at Sunday school on January 27. We had all of the students together for a nature-themed art project, bobbing for an apple hanging from a string, and a game of tag where those tagged became trees. Every once in a while, we use the last 45 minutes of the school day to gather the entire school together for various activities. The idea of interrupting class time for these school-wide events has been debated among the staff at some length. Questions are asked such as – Would learning be better served for all if we stayed in a more formal setting? Is this the best use of our teaching resources? Is the planning time taking away from teen education? But we consistently decide to keep including these events in our repertoire. There seems to be great benefit and joy to be gained from letting all the age groups work together. I see older kids gaining real confidence and a sense of responsibility from helping kids younger than themselves to succeed. I see younger kids getting a real sense that Shir Ami is an important and valuable place, by seeing that it is meaningful to the bigger kids. A sense of community, I guess, is what I'm seeing. I also see kids having fun, which is an important element of providing a quality school.

Speaking of providing a quality school, this month in my continuing series of teacher profiles I would like to introduce **Irene Gilchriese**. Irene is teaching our Bet or 2<sup>nd</sup> year Hebrew class this year, as well as teaching Religious School for the fourth and fifth graders. Outside of Shir Ami, Irene is a busy senior at Castro Valley High School. She is a Class 3 competitive soccer player, and is about to join the CVHS track team where she runs the 400 meters. Irene is taking photography this year at CVHS, and recenlty brought in a class portfolio which featured photographs of her Shir Ami students. Irene really enjoys the community aspect of Shir Ami, and likes the chance to give some of the education she received here back to her students. Irene says that she is constantly astounded by the smartness of the discussions taking place among her fourth and fifth graders. She feels like she is learning from them as well as teaching them. She is truly teaching them though, and has provided them with a lot of thought-provoking discussions around art with letters and words. They have also written poetry to explore the meanings of some of the prayers they have learned. Irene is likely headed to sunny Southern California in the fall, the direction where her college applications have gone. We will miss her, but thank her sincerely for all she has added to our school.


