Meet Suzy Stone:

Shalom L'Kulam,

Hi Everyone-- My name is Suzy Stone and I'm very excited to be working as one of your new student rabbis this year at Shir Ami. I am originally from Minneapolis, MN where I lived until I was 18 years old. I then went to Boston, MA where I earned a B.A. from Brandeis University in History and Sociology. When I graduated from Brandeis in 2002, I decided to stay in Boston for a few years where I worked for several different organizations in the non-profit sector. In 2002-2003 I was a fellow in a program known as the Jewish Organizing Initiative (JOI). JOI is a program that trains young Jewish adults to be grassroots organizers who understand the connection between Judaism and Social Justice. This was the first time that I really connected to Jewish texts and ritual. From there, my interest in Judaism grew and I found many rabbinic mentors in Boston to help me learn about Judaism in a much deeper way. After the JOI fellowship, I became the Regional Director of a small non-profit known as the Jewish Labor Committee (JLC). After two years of community organizing I decided take some time to reflect on my longterm goals. During this time, I taught English as a Second Language (ESL) at several different schools throughout the city. It was at this time that I also realized that I wanted to explore Judaism in a much deeper way. In 2006, before I left for my year in Israel, I moved to Phoenix, Arizona (where my parents retired) to work at Temple Chai as a Religious School Teacher and as their Retreat Coordinator. I loved my experience at Temple Chai and it only reinforced my decision to attend rabbinical school. In many ways, I now see Phoenix as my new home. Having just returned from my year in Israel, I am very excited to share with you some of my experiences, insights, and struggles. I am looking forward to getting to know the community and learning with – and from—you. I know that I have a lot to learn from all of you, so I hope that this year will be a year of growth for all of us!

From the Religious Action Center of the URJ...

You shall not abuse a needy and destitute laborer, whether a fellow Israelite or a stranger in one of the communities of your land. You must pay out the wages due on the same day, before the sun sets, for the worker is needy and urgently depends on it; else a cry to the Eternal will be issued against you and you will incur guilt. (Deuteronomy 24:14-15)

The South Hayward Parish (of which, Shir Ami is a member congregation) was founded over 40 years ago "to engage people of faith in the endeavor and partnership of building and maintaining a just and nurturing community." One year ago, the Parish founded the Hayward Day Labor Center to enable local workers to attain "self-sufficiency through employment and community integration programs." The multi-service center facilitates connections between workers and employers, assists with legal issues, financial planning, health care, basic needs services, and literacy.
