Rabbis' Corner Matt Dreffin Suzy Stone

Without looking below, take a moment and think of the 7 most important events in Jewish History. Your list might look something like this:

- 1) God's call to Abraham
- 2) Exodus from Egypt (and subsequent revelation in the desert)
- 3) The building/destruction of the First Temple
- 4) The building/destruction of the Second Temple
- 5) The Spanish Inquisition/Expulsion
- 6) Ha'Shoah
- 7) Establishment of the State of Israel.

These last two events are remarkable in that they have occurred within some of our lifetimes. David Ben Gurion, the first Prime Minister of Israel, noted that when the Knesset declared Yom Ha'Atzma'ut a public Holiday in 1949, it was the first time such an event was added to the Jewish Calendar in approximately 2000 years.

In the fall, we celebrate the Religious High Holy Days. In the spring, we mark the so-called "secular" High Holy Days: Yom Ha'shoah, Yom Ha'Zikaron, and Yom Ha'Atzmaut. The way in which the people of Israel commemorate these holidays is almost as remarkable as the events themselves. For both Yom Ha'Shoah and Yom Ha'Zikaron, a siren is sounded in the morning to commemorate the memories of those lost in the Holocaust and in defense of the state. The ENTIRE country stops at the same moment to mark these sacred times.

While a week separates Yom Ha'Shoah from Yom Ha'Zikaron, there is no break between Israel's Memorial Day and Independence Day. Much like Passover moves from slavery to redemption, Israel commemorates the lives of those that died to build the state before they celebrate the country's existence. Solemn reverence is replaced by things we're very familiar with for our own Independence Day: concerts, Bar-B-Q's and those all-important fireworks.

Much like Israel, our Memorial Day also falls in the month of May, but the Israelis seem to place a different sort of reverence upon it. Maybe it's because the Israeli is so close to the violence. Maybe it is because every Israeli can relate. Here in the United States, we commemorate our Servicemen and women in a different way. We think of the day off we're going to enjoy as if it were the Fourth of July.

I think it's important we take a lesson from our Israeli brethren. We will have our time to celebrate our country's independence, but for now we need to recognize the men and women of our military in the proper way. Take some time on this Memorial Day to properly recognize those that deserve it. It is important that we let those abroad and at home know that we appreciate and respect what they do to ensure the liberties that we so freely enjoy.

Shalom v'simcha l'culam.

KASHRUT - MORE THAN MEAT AND MILK

You shall not abuse a needy and destitute laborer, whether a fellow countryman or a stranger in one of the communities of your land. You must pay him wages on the same day, before the sun sets, for he is needy and he urgently depends on it.

Deuteronomy 24:14-15

Jewish tradition advocates employment with dignity and supports the right to employment with dignity. The Hekhsher Tzedek Campaign brings social justice standards to augment the existing regulations for kosher food production. The new symbol, which would be added to kosher food packages, is an "emanating" multi-layered Star of David. This new mark would indicate that the workers producing the kosher food receive adequate wages and benefits and that the company complies with environmental, corporate transparency, integrity, and employee health and safety standards. With the exception of transparency, which is considered a measure of trustworthiness, each of the other ethical certification areas represents a code within Jewish law.

The development of these standards follows investigation into kosher food factories and concerns regarding the working conditions and number of fines levied on particular companies. Started in 2007, Hekhsher Tzedek is a joint project of the Rabbinical Assembly and the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. Though the initiative, as well as the actual seal - the Magen Tzedek - the Hekhsher Tzedek commission will be responsible for credentialing manufacturing companies based on the aforementioned criteria. The Commission anticipates implementation of the Magen Tzedek by Rosh Hashannah this year. "By introducing Magen Tzedek, we are inviting the public to be a part of the conversation about kashrut, justice and Judaism," said Commission Co-Chair Jerold Jacobs. "Magen Tzedek draws together consumers of kosher food around the communal table to contemplate how to bring tzedek - justice - to the world."

"Our initiative has captured the hearts and minds of American Jews, reflecting deeply-held social and religious values," said Rabbi Morris Allen, creator and founder of the Hekhsher Tzedek initiative. "Magen Tzedek presents an opportunity to deepen one's observance of kashrut alongside social responsibility."
