### President's Message Ruth Hartman

Dear Shir Ami members and friends,

As you may know, our Reform movement holds a convention every two years. The most recent Biennial was held in Toronto in early November. (Leah Hartman wrote about her impressions of the event in last month's bulletin.)

At the Biennial Shabbat morning service, URJ president Rabbi Eric Yoffie offers new initiatives for the movement. This year, one of Rabbi Yoffie's topics was our relationship to food. The following is excerpted from an article by Rachel Cohen, who is Senior Legislative Assistant for energy and environmental issues at the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism:

"As Jews, we have always cared about the food that we eat. Some of us choose to embrace traditional notions of *kashrut* – and many of us do not – but we can all agree that our food, and how we get it, plays an important part in our lives.

That's why Rabbi Eric Yoffie opened one section of his 2009 Biennial Shabbat sermon with these words: 'Jewish history begins with a Jew – a new Jew, the first Jew – saying to others: come, eat with me. And ever since this first Jewish meal, Jews have believed that eating matters.'

These words have never been truer than they are for us today. Our Jewish values – caring for our neighbors, being good stewards of our earth and its resources, valuing our family and our community – all point to the need to think critically about the way we eat.

The more we learn about the impact of our current industrial food system on our bodies, our communities, and our planet, the more we are challenged to reconsider our own food choices. Scientific studies, articles in almost every major news outlet, and dozens of recent films remind us how important our food decisions are – and how far we have strayed from sustainable and ethical eating practices."

The Reform Movement's new *Shulchan Yarok, Shulchan Tzedek* (Green Table, Just Table) initiative (<a href="www.urj.org/life/food">www.urj.org/life/food</a>) challenges us all to discuss, debate, and perhaps to change our standards of ethical eating as Jews in the 21st century. This site has a lot of really interesting resources for more thoughtful, intentional, and ethical eating. Take advantage of your URJ membership by reviewing the ideas and suggestions you'll find there.

Rabbi Yoffie went on to declare, "Reform Jews are ethically aware, ecologically responsible, and sensitive to matters of physical and spiritual health. We know that our Jewish tradition speaks to these issues, and that our young people care about them. At such times, Reform Judaism does not remain silent."

In the past, Shir Ami has participated in the UFW grape boycott and other forms of ethical food consumption. Come celebrate Tu B'Shevat, the New Year of the Trees, at our seder on January 30<sup>th</sup> and explore how the Shir Ami community may rise to this challenge. What steps do you take in your home to express your Jewish values around food? Let me know—perhaps we'll print your stories in next month's bulletin.

Coming to the retreat but haven't yet registered? Here's info from Diana about this year's fascinating book discussion selection:

The book that I've chosen for the Women's Retreat is <u>Day After Night</u> by Anita Diamant, published by Simon & Schuster in 2009. It is available in hardcover and audio (either by download or on CD); the paperback is not due out until next summer.

The story is historical fiction (the back story is in the Epilogue), a tale about four women who survived the Holocaust, each in a different manner. They meet in pre-state Israel where they are incarcerated in a British prison camp, Atlit, because they each lack the proper papers to immigrate. Though haunted by unspeakable memories and innumerable losses, these women find salvation through the bonds of friendship and love as they confront the challenges of rebuilding their lives.

I've chosen this book for several reasons. The story is told in a very readable manner and should be accessible to all. Diamant is a skillful writer and develops her characters clearly and well. The protagonists are all women, which is appropriate for our retreat. And, at various places in the novel, each woman regains part of her capacity to take pleasure and delight in herself, in her friends and in the new world in which she finds herself. We may find parallels to ourselves and our world in this lovely new book.

Daryl Berman participated in the annual School of the Americas Watchprotests at the gates of Ft. Benning, in Columbus, Georgia in November. Daryl, along with Rev. John Wichman and Amy Rickard of the Westminster Hills Presbyterian Church and Jim Forsyth of Starr King Unitarian Universalist Church, joined with 15,000 others from every state and many countries. The protest was started in 1990 by Fr. Roy Bourgeois, a Maryknoll Father and Vietnam vet, to speak out against the U.S. role in training Latin American soldiers in repressive U.S.-supported military regimes. A bill to close the training center at Fort Benning, HR2567 (McGovern, D- MA), has 89 coauthors including Reps. Barbara Lee, Pete Stark and Jerry McNerney.

Midrasha program offers eclectic learning opportunities for teens

Tri-Valley/Tri-Cities Midrasha, in collaboration with Congregation Beth Emek, recently co-hosted Benjamin Nugent, author of the book "American Nerd: The Story of My People." In the spirit of the evening, the teens--along with Midrasha Director Day Schildkret--greeted the author in full-out "nerd" dress to learn about the ethnic and racial stereotypes behind nerdiness. The literary event was part of the 21st Annual Contra Costa Jewish Book and Arts Festival.

Three weeks later, in an event co-sponsored by Beth Emek's Israel & World Jewry Committee, the teens met with Akiva Tor, the Consul General of Israel to the Pacific Northwest. Mr. Tor spoke about "Israel: Challenges and Opportunities," including Israel's desire for peace alongside an independent Palestinian state and the concern about nuclear proliferation in Iran.


