President's Message Ruth Hartman

Dear Shir Ami members and friends,

Jewish philanthropy is a marvelous thing. The mitzvah of tzedakah, and a tradition that emphasizes repair of the world, spur Jews to share even modest good fortune with those around us. Jews give to support Jewish community organizations, to assist people in need, to support the arts, to build hospitals and schools, to encourage political advocacy and activism, and much more. We give of our time and skills as well as of our material resources. We teach and promote the value of tzedakah as a lifelong practice and a core expression of what it means to be a Jew and a human being.

When a terrible disaster such as the January 12 Haiti earthquake strikes, the Jewish community mobilizes to help. Two examples:

- The Union for Reform Judaism (www.urj.org/relief): In one week following the quake, the Reform Movement raised more than \$500,000 for Haiti disaster relief efforts. Based on communication with partner relief organizations, allocations will be made to support emergency relief efforts including rescue work, emergency medical care, temporary shelter and food and water distribution. In the coming weeks, additional Union allocations will fund longer-term recovery efforts.
- American Jewish World Service (www.ajws.org/haiti): AJWS has created the Haiti Earthquake Relief Fund to send immediate emergency aid to communities affected by this disaster. Particular focus is being placed on aiding populations in the crisis zone that have not already been targeted for large-scale relief, such as poor and rural areas outside Port-au-Prince. AJWS's long-standing partnerships in the region have enabled AJWS to send funding directly to grantees in hard-hit areas on the ground who have the knowledge and capacity to spend the money effectively where it is most immediately needed.

Jewish tradition teaches that the spiritual benefit of doing tzedakah is so great that the giver benefits even more than the recipient. The word tzedakah comes from the word tzedek, which means righteous. According to Kabbalah (Jewish mysticism), the only difference between the two words is the Hebrew letter "hey," which represents the Divine name. Kabbalists explain that tzedakah is a partnership between the righteous and God, and acts of tzedakah are permeated with God's goodness.

Rabbis' Corner

Matt Dreffin Suzy Stone

With each passing day, estimates for the death toll in Haiti continue to increase after the tragic events that shook the island country on January 12, 2010. Sources suggest that somewhere between 150,000-200,000 victims have perished because of this tragedy thus far. If you are anything like me, it is hard not to ask the question 'why'?

Why did this terrible natural disaster have to occur? Some people may answer this question with a scientific explanation (e.g., the location of the fault line, or how the buildings were not up to earthquake ready standards, etc.). No doubt, they are right. But the question raises a much more spiritual dilemma for me. How is it that so many innocent people had to die, and that so many survivors are left with so much grief in the face of a natural disaster?

I don't know about you, but sometimes, I have an easier time understanding human-made disasters rather than natural ones. It is hard for me to wrap my head around the fact that God's glorious creation, the one that we praise every day and every Shabbat through our prayers and psalms, could also be the source of so much destruction.

In Jewish thought, there is something known as "Deuteronomistic Theology." In essence, the rationale is that if the Israelites behave, God will reward them, and if they do not behave God will punish them. Oftentimes, this punishment includes kicking the Israelites out of the Promised Land, or bringing famine or drought upon the land. In other words, the punishment is often seen as a physical reaction by God towards the Israelites. Throughout much of Jewish history, this has been one of the primary beliefs held by traditional Jews.

The thinkers of the Reform Movement, beginning in 19th century Germany, started to re-evaluate their relationship to this theology. In fact, because they did not feel comfortable with this type of reward and punishment theology, the Reform Movement removed the second paragraph of the Shema from our prayer books.

As the Reform Movement has started to re-incorporate more Hebrew and more traditional prayers back into our siddurim, the second paragraph of the Shema became a hot topic of debate during the publication of the new siddur, Mishkan T'filah. There were countless debates about whether or not the Reform Movement should reinsert the following lines from the Torah into our prayer books: "Take care not to be lured away to serve other gods and bow to them. For the LORD's anger will flare up against you, and He will shut up the skies so that there will be no rain and the ground will not yield its produce; and you will

soon perish from the good land that the LORD is assigning to you" (Duet. 11:16-17)

Ultimately, the Classical Reform sentiment won out and the lines remain absent from our new prayer book. In the end, I believe this was a wise decision and one that makes me appreciate our ability of Reform Jews to align our beliefs with our words and our actions. Moreover, I am amazed by the fact that in ancient times, the Rabbis were also struggling with this same tension. The question for them was whether or not God really rewards us, or punishes us, through nature.

Thus, the rabbis ask: "Suppose a man stole a measure of wheat and went and sowed it in the ground. It would surely be right (din hu) that the wheat should not grow. But the world pursues its natural course (olam k'minhago noheg). Further, supposing a man has intercourse with his neighbor's wife, it would surely be right (din hu) that she should not conceive. But the world pursues its natural course (olam k'minhago noheg)" (Babylonian Talmud, Avodah Zarah 54b).

While some fundamentalists might argue otherwise, I believe that Judaism teaches us that God does not intervene in the laws of nature based on the morality or immorality of our actions. For me, this rabbinic teaching redeems the Jews from living a life in which we are waiting to be "rewarded" or "punished" for our deeds. We are not a religion of fear, but a religion of action and healing.

I hope that in the coming months that all of us will continue donating our time, money and prayers to the community in Haiti. May God protect us and keep us.


