#### President's Message Ruth Hartman

Dear Shir Ami members and friends,

In case you didn't get a chance to read the email we sent to our members in mid-February, I am using my column this month to talk about our school merger plan. I apologize to those of you for whom this is now "old news." But I want to be sure that everyone knows what is happening and why.

We are engaged in discussions with Temple Beth Sholom (TBS) in San Leandro about merging the Religious School programs of our two congregations. We believe that this proposal will bring many benefits to the youth and families of both congregations.

Jodi Blum has been our Religious School director for nearly four years, this year in partnership with Barb Haber. Both of these wonderful women have done an outstanding job, and both have said that this is their last year running the school. We have no internal candidates, and when we looked at the prospect of hiring an outside Director for our very small school program, and all that would involve, we considered the fact that just a few miles away there is another small Religious School with a very similar approach to Jewish education.

The TBS Torah School is led by Rinat Manhoff, a very able, experienced, and creative Jewish educator whom many of us admire and respect a great deal. Rinat is a middle-school teacher who has also been the director of Camp Kadima for the past several years, as well as teaching at Oakland Midrasha. By combining our schools, we could benefit from the leadership of this trusted educator, preserve the best parts of our small-school culture, provide our children with an expanded peer group, strengthen our curriculum and support for our teachers, and establish a positive, collaborative working relationship with our neighbors at TBS.

The leadership of TBS is very enthusiastic about the idea of combining our schools. The Shir Ami Board developed a list of concerns, including maintaining our joyful and loving "camp-like"

school culture, continuing to meet at Shir Ami at least some of the time, a clear leadership role for our Rabbinic Interns, continued leadership opportunities for our teens, and a Reform-friendly curriculum.

Jodi and Barb held an initial meeting with Rinat and Rabbi Harry Manhoff on January 31. They discussed all the issues on our list, and many other topics. It was clear that there is much more to discuss and figure out, but there were no major disagreements or "show-stoppers." Subsequent informal contacts have continued to be positive and collaborative.

Our two school communities share many common interests and challenges, especially the challenge of providing a peer group for our children at each grade level. We believe that each community has strengths that will complement the other, and that bringing our students together into stronger age cohorts will benefit everyone.

We are now forming a small committee of interested parents, teachers, and community members from Shir Ami and TBS to help craft and execute the consolidation plan and be involved in the school going forward. Jodi and Rinat will lead the committee, with a first meeting in mid-March. Assuming that all goes well, and we believe it will, the combined school program will begin in September, 2010.

This is a significant change for Congregation Shir Ami, but we strongly believe that it is in the best interest of our youth and our Jewish community. The following people are available to listen to your ideas and concerns and to discuss the plans with you: myself, Barb Haber, Jodi Blum, Bonnie Frey, Harriet Skelly, Diana Zankowsky, and Rabbi Matt Dreffin. We are available by phone or email, or to meet over a cup of coffee.

#### Rabbis' Corner

#### Matt Dreffin Suzy Stone

Let's play a game. I'll name a Jewish holiday and you guess whether we are supposed to fast or feast. We'll start easy.

Yom Kippur... ... A fasting holiday, of course.

Rosh Hashanah? ... Feast.
Sukkot? ... Feast again.
Simchat Torah? ... Keep on feasting.

The 9<sup>th</sup> of Av? ... Fast.

Purim? ... Feast.

Passover? ... Both.

While the act of fasting and feasting seem very different, they both serve the same end. Setting aside a specific meal, or lack thereof, helps us to differentiate from the *chol* and the *kadosh*, the profane and the holy. Even though we use markers such as candles and prayers, the significance of food grabs us in a completely different way. Unlike the visual and auditory senses, which help us perceive the sanctity of the day, the use of food we feel from our insides. We taste the deliciousness of Shabbat or we feel the pain in our gut when fasting on the Day of Atonement. By associating our holidays with fasting or feasting, we bring their essence to the core of our being.

Notice from our chart that Passover is unique. While we abstain from eating particular foods, we also celebrate our liberation from bondage with a festive meal. In the month of *Nisan* we find ourselves dually fasting and feasting. *Nisan* is of course, our month of redemption, where we experience the trials and tribulations of slavery and end in freedom and revelation. Furthermore, from the very start of the month, we search for *chametz*, trying to eliminate it from our households, allowing ourselves a clean and pure Passover.

As we transfer from the happiness of the month of Adar, and begin to contemplate our lives in our month of redemption, I invite you to take some time and contemplate how you can integrate the process of eating holy into your weekly (or even daily) tradition. Begin your process of searching for the metaphorical chametz in your lives. Below you will find some resources for holier living. Nothing is stopping us from making more than just the holidays z'manim k'doshim, holy times. This can be accomplished in our daily lives

Creamy Tomato Soup (From RelishMag. com) 2 Tablespoons olive oil 1 medium onion, chopped

1 carrot, peeled and chopped

1 bay leaf

1 clove garlic, peeled and minced 2-3 Tablespoons brown sugar pinch of ground cloves 3 cups vegetable broth 2-28 cans crushed tomatoes ½ teaspoon salt coarsely ground black pepper ½ cup half and half

Heat olive oil in large pan. Add onion, carrot and bay leaf. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally until all are soft (about 5 minutes).

Add brown sugar and cloves; stir until vegetables are well coated.

Add broth and tomatoes. Bring to a simmer. Cover; reduce heat and cook 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Remove bay leaf. Working in small batches, puree soup in blender or food processor until smooth. Add salt and pepper.

If serving immediately, add half and half and serve.

If serving later, refrigerate soup and reheat before serving; add half and half just before serving. (NOTE: half and half will curdle if soup is too hot).

# AN OPPORTUNITY AND A CHALLENGE FOR SOUTH HAYWARD PARISH\*

**The Problem:** Finding fresh fruits and vegetables to insure that the folk who use the SHP Food Pantry and other food distribution programs in Hayward have what they need to maintain good health with a well balanced diet.

**The Opportunity:** Each Saturday as the Hayward Farmer's Market closes around 2:30 PM, unsold produce is often thrown away. Many pounds of usable fruit and vegetables go into the land fill. The Market managers would be delighted to have the Parish contact the vendors and arrange to pick up this unwanted produce. The Parish owns a large cargo van to transport produce to a central distribution site where cooperating food pantries could pick up what they can use.

**The challenge:** In order to take advantage of this opportunity the Parish must be able to promise consistency...that we will pick up produce <u>every week!</u> And this means finding person power. In the long run, we are searching for a funding source that will allow us to pay some folk to undertake this project. But in the short run, needed produce is going to waste. So the challenge becomes finding volunteers who are able to help. The van driver will be the key to the project. The driver needs to show proof of auto insurance as required by the State and a clean DMV printout. One regular helper will be needed. We will also be looking to our friends in the Community Action Network and Day Labor Center projects for additional help.

Sephardic communities in Turkey, Greece, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia, Morocco, Italy, Israel, and the United States preserved many ballads, holiday and religious songs, and especially love songs which had been passed down orally for generations. Contemporary renditions have been recorded by Yehoram Gaon, Judy Frankel, Yasmin Levy, Kit Parra, Ron Eliran, Pavarim, Voice of the Turtle, Gerineldo and dozens of other performers.
