Dear Shir Ami Members and Friends.

My name is Lara Pullan Regev, and I will be serving as one of your two student Rabbis for the next year! I hope this issue of the Shir Ami bulletin finds all of you in a summery relaxed state of being.

Plans for the upcoming religious school year are underway, and our new director for the combined schools, Rinat Manhoff, has already held a planning meeting with next year's teaching staff. Many of our Shir Ami staff members will be returning and your children will be welcomed back in the fall by some familiar faces as well as some enthusiastic and dedicated new teachers.

The biggest change that will happen as the schools combine is that the meeting time and day for Hebrew class is going to be different. Combining the schools allows us to strengthen our Hebrew program by providing the opportunity for class to meet for two hours on Tuesday afternoons from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Religious school will meet on Sunday mornings from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. All of us involved with planning for the school want to make this transition to the new schedule as supportive as possible.

TAKE ACTION

Employees at the Castlewood Country Club have been unionized for over 30 years. In September of 2009, these servers, event staff, cooks, and janitors began their contract negotiations in good faith. Castlewood expected to raise the employee cost for healthcare benefits from \$0 to \$739 per month. Average hourly wage for Castlewood workers is \$12.50 per hour. Workers countered with an offer of \$225 per month. Castlewood broke off negotiations and locked out the workers. The 61 workers have been locked out of the jobs they've held for 2-20 years for 5 months now.

Make your dollars speak for you. If you want to promote fair working conditions, learn about a company before you reserve their site for event, utilize their services, or purchase their products. Your choices can make a world of difference.

PRESCRIPTION FOR FAILURE

Roger is a 10 year resident of Hayward. While he has always been sober, he has not been able to



maintain housing long term. Now working with vocational services to get more stability, he is still on the street and has developed an infection. When he sought medical services, they gave him a paper prescription for medication. Without an income or transportation, this piece of paper was unable to cure his infection. When he sought further medical treatment, feeling worse after a few weeks, the second paper prescription netted the same results.

The Hayward Community Action Network (CAN) brings together individuals who are homeless, faith communities, businesses, and social and govern-

ment services to develop sustainable solutions. CAN facilitates connection to services, food, clothing, and basic needs resources through information and referrals, advocacy, direct service, and coalition building. Through a donation to CAN, Roger was able to fill his prescription and is back on track with his vocational program. Other individuals have been able to reach Highland Hospital through donated BART Tickets or to apply for work with an AC Transit ticket or phone card. Donations to CAN are tax-deductible, though our parent organization, South Hayward Parish (see address above). Small donations for Walgreens or CVS gift cards, Public Transportation Tickets, or Phone Cards (Tracfone or similar) can help individuals to take an active role in their own success.



CONTEMPORARY JEWISH MUSEUM VISIT

What a trip!

Really.

Seventeen Shir Ami members and friends went on a trip to the Contemporary Jewish Museum in San Francisco on July 11 to see the current exhibit, "As It Is Written: Project 304,805." The number 304,805 refers to how many Hebrew letters there are in a Sefer Torah.

First we had an opportunity to talk with the Soferet, Julie Seltzer, who is actually hand writing a complete Torah right at the museum. We asked her questions ranging from how the ink is made to how the parchment sheets are sewn together. We even asked her about how it feels to write a Torah. She explained that she prepares herself both physically and mentally through traditional prayers and techniques of concentration.

Then we toured the exhibit with a private docent who explained how the elaborately-decorated Holy Ark from Cochin, India came to be in the museum. We saw a Torah scroll encased in a silver "tik" or box in the manner of the Sephardic Jews. We watched a presentation of how each letter is formed in the beautiful Stam "hand" that is universally used for writing a Torah. And we actually were able to touch a sample of parchment, saw how a turkey feather is made into a quill, and were amazed by the shine of the ink on Ms. Seltzer's newly-written pages.

Those of us who could linger after our tour enjoyed a light meal at the museum's café and posed for the picture accompanying this article. Some of us enhanced our trip by viewing the museum's other exhibits and ended our museum visit with the obligatory stop in the gift shop. We all agreed that the day had been an adventure and an inspiration.
