



Paresha Emor "Speak" - Moses is commanded to speak to the Kohanim

The Torah section of Emor discusses the special laws pertaining to the Kohanim ("priests"), the Kohen Gadol (*High Priest"), and the Temple service: A Kohen may not become ritually impure through contact with a dead body, except on the occasion of the death of a close relative. A Kohen may not marry a divorcee or a woman with a promiscuous past; a Kohen Gadol can marry only a virgin. A Kohen with a physical deformity cannot serve in the Holy Temple, nor can a deformed animal be brought as an offering.

Greenwaste/Recycling/Garbage

Thanks to Bonnie Frey, Shir Ami has expanded it's recycling services.

- Greenwaste: includes food scraps in addition to plant trimmings. Food scraps includes all paper and cardboard that held food for example, pizza boxes. When we take out the green waste, we are allowed to place the entire garbage bag in the green waste cart outside, but it must be untied and left open. This applies only to green waste.
- The recycling must not be left in a garbage bag in the cart, it needs to be loose.
- This is a special rule for Shir Ami as a business, which is different than the rules for residential customers in Castro Valley.

MAY ROSH CHODESH: Iyar Wednesday, May 4, Dinner at 7:00 pm Home of Rose Firestone

Iyar is a month of transition, falling between Pesach and Shavuot. The days are ritualistically counted for 49 days and the period is observed as a time of semi-mourning.

The 33rd day, however, Lag B'Omer, is a special day, associated with bonfires, picnics and celebration. Haircuts, not allowed during most of the period, are permitted, and many three year olds receive their first haircut on this day.

We will celebrate Lag B'Omer with a "picnic" dinner at 7:00 pm. We will (weather permitting) enjoy a bonfire in a firepit, followed by a discussion of Iyar, a month of transitions.

THE MAIMOUNA- by Rose Levine

Israel is a land where there is an exciting meld of many cultures and customs. Three years ago Hillie and I were in Israel for Pesach. We stayed with friends in Mevasereth Tzion, an affluent community just outside Jerusalem. Their Seder incorporated a combination of Ashkenazi and Iraqi traditions.

But on the last day of Pesach, we were told that we would be experiencing a different tradition. We were invited to a neighbor's home to celebrate the Maimouna. The Maimouna is unique to Moroccan Jewry, and is celebrated by Israel's Moroccan Jewish community immediately following the con-

clusion of Passover, on the eve of the eighth day.

We were not the only ones to be invited; it seemed that the whole neighborhood was there. We were greeted warmly by the host and hostess, who were dressed in

traditional Moroccan robes. Their home was decorated with Moroccan art and artifacts. A huge long table was set with symbolic foods and an incredible array of food and drink. Especially impressive was the sweet table, covered with flowers and stalks of wheat. It held dozens of platters filled with pastries, chocolate covered apricots, marzipan fruits and vegetables, sesame candies



and even baskets made of sesame seeds. A special pancake with honey called muflita was served, as was fish and various other greens to symbolize good luck and fertility in the coming year. The ladies of the family had been preparing for this feast since Purim!

It is a very joyous holiday. Besides the evening home visits such as we experienced, on the next day, the eighth day of Passover, it is also customary to continue the festivities with lively family picnics and bar-b-cues. There is no clear explanation of the name. Some say the word Maimouna derives from the name Maimon ben Joseph, a scholar who lived in Fez, Morocco, father of



the great philosopher Maimonides. Others claim it comes from the Arabic word for wealth and good fortune, ma'amoun. Still others claim that it originates in Ani Ma'amin, I believe, and that it is an expression of faith. Since Pesach is the beginning of the new agricultural year, it is the time to pray for plentiful crops, prosperity and fertility.

BIRTHRIGHT TRIP TO ISRAEL

Maryanne Leshin's daughter, Lola Ridgell, is a Freshman at SF State. She participated in a Birthright trip to Israel during Winter Break. When she returned, we asked her to tell us about the trip. Here are some of the questions put to her, and the answers she gave us.

1. Question: Why were you interested in going on this trip?

Who would turn down a free trip to Israel? But really, I was initially drawn to the trip because someone I met in the dorms had gone over the summer and said it was amazing

2. Q. How many people were in your group? Were they all from the Bay Area? How old were they? Did you know any of them beforehand?

There were 30 people in my group not counting 2 very cool group leaders. The people on my trip were from all over California. Most people were around 19 or 20 but there were people from 18-26. I didn't know anyone before hand, which made me experience in Israel even better.

3. Q. How many days were you gone? Where did you stay?

I was gone for 12 days (2 days dedicated completely to departure and arrival) we spent time in Tel Aviv, the Negev (the desert area), the Dead Sea, and so many other places. We spent our nights in hotels for the most part as well as kibbutzim and we even spent a night in a tent which was actually a lot of fun

4. Q. What was your first impression when you landed at Ben Gurion Airport? How about your later impressions? Did anything about Israel surprise you? Did the trip come up to your expectations?

That's a long question! Um, when I first landed in the air port I was tired, didn't know anyone but some people were already starting to talk to me. Many things about Israel surprised me, like the diversity and all the beautiful places there are despite what we see in the news. The trip exceeded my expectations by far.

5. Q. What activities did you participate in? What place was your favorite place to visit?

One of the most memorable days was when we visited a communal farm. It was so cool that I wanted to extend my trip right then and there but the extension option didn't work with my schedule. We went on some really cool hikes through the desert areas. When we were in Tel Aviv we had a free night to spend however we wanted. Most of my group went to some local club but I got



up from the group and couldn't find my way there. Words of advice: DON'T spend forever getting ready and get left by the group. We got to swim in the Dead Sea which was cool cause I'm sure everyone knows make you float (don't get the water in your mouth it doesn't taste good). We climbed mount Masada very early and watched the sun rise which sound like a pain, but it was very fun. We also spent two days in Jerusalem which is a very beautiful city, and we were given lots of time to explore with out our group leaders

6. Q. How did you spend Shabbat? What was your reaction to the Western Wall?

One of our Shabbat celebrations was held in a conference room of the hotel we were staying at, they brought in a really cool local rabbi who lead a very relaxed casual service. The Western Wall was packed when I went but it was still very cool because I got to put not only a note from myself but notes from other people that might not ever get a chance to go to Israel which I suggest you do.

7. Q. Did you visit Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Memorial? If so, what impressions do you have of it?

The Yad Vashem museum was amazing, I doubt you will see anything like in the states, and if you have an awesome tour guide like I did it will definitely add to your experience! Something to know about Yad Vashem though, while it may make you very emotional (it might make you cry) the atmosphere is very uplifting.

8. Q. How is it different to be Jewish here, and Jewish in Israel?

Have you ever found yourself trying to explain why your eating what your eating or doing what your doing or trying to explain why Jews do this or why being Jewish means that? Or felt uncomfortable talking about Judaism? You don't have to feel that way in Israel. Something that was cool: Everything closes at around 3 o'clock on Fridays for Shabbat. The candle lighting times are on the front pages of the papers. It may not seem like that big of a deal just reading it but when your there, and you see everyone closing down shop to get home before Shabbat you see that it's really a beautiful thing.

9. Q. Did you meet with Israelis your age? Were any of them Arabs? Do you think the young people there lead the same kind of life as young people here?

5 days into the trip we were joined by Israeli soldiers our age and they were some of the coolest people ever. We met all sorts of people. I met Indian people, Arab people, Black people, people from Argentina, people from other Spanish speaking countries, other Americans who were visiting. Being in Israel is truly a unique experience

10. Q. Did they speak of the political situation? Did you feel safe? Were you able to communicate with your parents?

I felt COMPLETELY safe there wasn't a moment I was worried about my safety. As far as talking about politics I *learned* a lot about certain political situations but I didn't get to deep into conversations about politics. I was able to communicate with my parents but I didn't do much of that as you can imagine.

11. Q. Now that you've gone on the trip, do you feel differently about Israel than you did before? What did you learn?

I do feel differently about Israel, it's hard to say in what ways. The experience is going to have different affects on everyone. I learned so much, I learned about camels, and Bedouins, water, plants, Israeli government, history, Hebrew and much, much more.

12. Q. What do you think is the purpose of the trip? In your opinion, did it fulfill its purpose?

I know many people feel that birthright trips have an agenda, can't say this about all birthright organizations, but the trip I went on, Israel outdoors, was really just about enjoying your time in Israel and teaching you about the land of Israel. We weren't pushed to think a certain way, or begged to move there. Personally, I would love to live there in the future but that wasn't part of any "agenda".

13. Q. Will there be a follow up on the trip? Are you in touch with anyone you met?

I am Facebook friends with nearly



everyone I went on the trip with including the Israeli soldiers and our awesome security guard/ medic, who was soooo funny. I was surprised at how close I became with people. I still keep in touch with a lot of people from the trip, I would say I'm BFF's with anyone from the trip but it's a very unique bond that we all have with each other; we share inside jokes, memories, we follow up on things we talked about while in Israel.

14. Q. Would you recommend this trip to others at Shir Ami?

I would definitely recommend Israel outdoors! If your going to pick a different group to go with make sure to

do your research. I also recommend that you DON'T go with someone you know. You have a much better chance of making really strong connections with new people if your not being surrounded by someone you know. I came home with tons of stories! I really recommend going.
