President's Message

Dear Shir Ami Members and Friends:

I wish all of you a sweet new year – L'Shana Tova!

In my column last month I wrote about hosting the Rabbinic interns and promised that I would write about hosting Onegs next. Hosting an Oneg is a mitzvah just as hosting the Rabbinic interns is. So I'd like to focus on the larger topic of Mitzvah this month, which also happens to be the theme this year at the Shir Shalom school. You can find the directions for hosting Onegs in this bulletin, and if you want to sign up to host an oneg or have any questions about it please contact Sharon Golembo, our Oneg coordinator.

On Sunday, September 25 I attended the Bagel and Lox Potluck brunch sponsored by Shir Ami's Men's Club. The topic of discussion was South Hayward Parish: Many Faiths Joined for Tikun Olam. Shir Ami is a member of the South Hayward Parish and our own Daryl Berman is the President of the South Hayward Parish Board of Directors. Ralph Morales, Director of the Food Pantry program, and Sara Lamnin, Director of Hayward CAN (Community Action Network) gave overviews of their programs. This presentation really struck a chord with me. The Food Pantry gives unprepared food to those in need all year round – not just during the holidays. They get their food from direct donations and from the Alameda County Food Bank. This year Shir Ami will again be collecting food at Yom Kippur services and the food will go directly to the Food Pantry. Hayward CAN runs programs to help the homeless of the Hayward/Castro Valley area find housing, jobs, and social services, and has several programs where the homeless teach their peers skills such as jewelry making, gardening, etc. There is a great need for blankets, coats, clothes, toiletries, etc which Hayward CAN will distribute to those in need.

Did you know it is a Mitzvah to sit in a Sukkah at Sukkot and have a meal or study? Did you know that Peter Lewis and Milt Palmer are building Shir Ami a new and improved Sukkah? Of course, we can't perform the first Mitzvah without getting the new Sukkah decorated and ready! **There will be a Sukkah decorating party at Shir Ami on Sunday, October 9 from 3pm – 6pm –** another Mitzvah opportunity! We will be putting up the new fabric walls and making decorations for the inside. And of course there will be food for all who come and participate! There are so many Mitzvah opportunities out there – I just mentioned a few. I made a promise to myself

that I will offer knitting lessons to the Hayward CAN so the clients there can make scarves and hats for their peers and themselves. What new Mitzvah will you decide to do in this New Year of 5772? I'm sure you can find one that uses your own particular talent and skills. And I know we would all like to read about it in the Community page of the bulletin!

Hillie & Rose's granddaughter Shira was married to Jon Abel September 4 in Ann Arbor, Michigan. The entire Levine family traveled to the joyful event. The wedding ceremony took place in a beautiful garden setting. The weather gods must have been smiling on the 175 guests because it was the ONLY day of that whole week in which there was no oppressive heat wave, no pouring rain, and no spectacular lightning and thunder storm.









Do you see a family resemblance to Ruth Hartman? That's because this is Emily Einsbruch, Ruth's sister. So what's her connection to the Levine wedding? Coincidentally, Emily lives in Ann Arbor, and she and her husband Avi are good friends of Jonathan and Noga, the bride's parents.

NEW-OLD WEDDING CUSTOM

We've learned that a tradition has appeared lately at some Jewish weddings- the "SHTICK"-entertaining the bride and groom. Actually, this custom has been around for a long time, especially among the Chasidim (e.g. the "bottle dance" in Fiddler on the Roof) but now it seems to be making an appearance at modern non-Orthodox weddings. The couple's friends might plan a surprise show, or do a special dance, or dress the bride and groom in funny costumes. Messages with good wishes and "inside" jokes are presented to the newlyweds, all this to the beat of lively music. Hey, wouldn't it be "cool" to introduce the custom in Castro Valley?

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SHIR AMI'S TORAHS

There has been a request from our readers to tell the history of our two Torahs. The Torah with the blue velvet mantle and Tree of Life breastplate originally comes from a synagogue in Dresden, Germany. On the night known as "Crystal Night," the night of November 10, 1938, the Nazis went on an anti-Semitic rampage of destruction throughout Germany. They set fires to dozens of synagogues, and in many cities, the fire departments were instructed not to



extinguish the fires. It seems though, that someone managed to spray water on the fire in that synagogue. Fortunately, the Torah was rescued, but it suffered water damage that is still evident today. The person who carried out the scroll from the ravaged synagogue brought it to the U.S. and gave it to the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Shir Ami bought it from the U.A.H.C. when we formed as a congregation in 1965.

In 1990 we had the scroll restored in memory of our first president, Stanley Blackfield. The scribe who did the work established that the text was written on deerskin, is over 200 years old, and is of Bavarian origin. He recognized the water stains, and also determined that many pages were frayed, and that letters had been obliterated. He repaired it as best he could, but it is still very fragile. Shir Ami held a special ceremony to celebrate the restoration and to re-dedicate the restored Torah.

THE SECOND SCROLL

The scroll with the burgundy velvet mantle and breastplate depicting the Twelve Tribes was purchased in 1993 to honor our Religious Chairman, Rolf Weinberg. The rabbi who sold it to us



confirmed that it is approximately one hundred years old, and that it originated in the small shtetl town of Mir in Belarus, not far from what we now know as Lithuania. The renowned Mir Yeshiva was a center for writing Torahs; Torahs were distributed from there to other areas in Eastern Europe. In Exodus 15:2 it says, "This is my God, and I will glorify Him." The Talmud elaborates on how to outwardly show this love for God by these words, "Make a beautiful scroll of the Law, written with fine ink and fine reed by a skilled penman, and wrap it about with beautiful silks." We chose this Torah, because it is, in fact, written with fine ink, and in a fine hand.

We use this second scroll at regular services and for B'nai Mitzvoth. The first one, because it is so fragile, is only used symbolically or when two Torahs are called for, for example, at Simchat Torah, when the reading of the five books is completed, and the new cycle of readings starts again with "Breshit, In the Beginning."

Both Ralph and Sara eloquently demonstrated how the SHP's programs provide their clients not only with their essential needs, but also a sense of hope that their situations are not permanent and can be improved through collaboration and commitment. SHP Executive Director, Betty Deforest, closed the presentation by discussing how help of all types are needed, including both food and money donations, as well as volunteer service, such as food pickup and delivery, and teaching skills to program clients. How To Host an Oneg

Instructions for Hosting an Oneg

This is a regular Shabbat service starting at 8 pm. Please plan to arrive by 7:45 for setup.

You will need to bring:

Challah, grape juice, sweet wine, and an assortment of dessert items (fruit, baked goods, cheese and crackers, etc.). For a regular Friday night service, expect 15 to 25 people. For a special event or holiday service, expect as many as 40-60 people.

The temple provides paper goods, small cups for Kiddush, coffee, tea, sugar, creamer, etc. If paper supplies in the cabinet are low, check the bathtub for additional supplies. If you notice supplies getting very low, write what is missing or needed on the list located in the cabinet where the oneg supplies are kept so that we can replenish it on our next shopping trip.

In an effort to *Go Green*, we are trying to use less plastic and more of our silverware. This makes cleanup a little more time consuming but helps Mother Earth! The silverware is located in the drawers under the counter. Reusable plates and cups are also available. They are located in the tall narrow cupboard on the right in the very back of the sanctuary/library. If you choose to use these, please wash, dry, and replace them at the end of the evening, or load them in the dishwasher and turn it on before you leave.

Place a Kiddush cup with wine (for the Rabbi) on the buffet table with the covered Challah. Prepare trays of grape juice and wine in the small cups to distribute for Kiddush.

If necessary, set up chairs for services. Put Shabbat candles in candlesticks and smaller candles in the menorah. (The candles are stored in the low cupboard to the right as you face the bimah.)

At the end of the evening, sweep the kitchen floors. We now have recycling service at Shir Ami! So collect recyclables separately during the evening. Take out all trash and recycling (cans are to your right as you go out the front door) and place fresh liners in the waste baskets (these are in the tall utility closet next to the dishwasher). Place the lit Shabbat candlesticks in the sink for fire safety. Check to be sure that the stove and oven are off. Turn off all lights in the building and double-check that all doors are locked.

Feel free to ask others to help you with both setup and cleanup. Most congregants are happy to lend a hand, and the job can be quite enjoyable when done with friends!

Hosting an Oneg with a Potluck (see next page)

Instructions for Hosting an Oneg with a Potluck

This is a Pot Luck Shabbat dinner starting at 6:30, followed by services at 8 pm. Please plan to arrive by 6:15 for setup.

You will need to bring:

Challah, grape juice, sweet wine, and an assortment of dessert items (fruit is great). For a regular Friday night service, expect 15 to 25 people. For a special event or holiday service, expect as many as 40-60 people.

The temple provides paper goods, small cups for Kiddush, coffee, tea, sugar, creamer, etc. If paper supplies in the cabinet are low, check the bathtub for additional supplies. If you notice supplies getting very low, write what is missing or needed on the list located in the cabinet where the oneg supplies are kept so that we can replenish it on our next shopping trip.

In an effort to *Go Green*, we are trying to use less plastic and more of our silverware. This makes cleanup a little more time consuming but helps Mother Earth! The silverware is located in the drawers under the counter. Reusable plates and cups are also available. They are located in the tall narrow cupboard on the right in the very back of the sanctuary/library. If you choose to use these, please wash, dry, and replace them at the end of the evening, or load them in the dishwasher and turn it on before you leave.

Set up tables and chairs in the sanctuary for the expected number of attendees. Tablecloths are in a marked drawer under the kitchen counter. Place a Kiddush cup with wine (for the Rabbi) on the buffet table with the covered Challah. Prepare trays of grape juice and wine in the small cups to distribute for Kiddush. As people arrive with their pot luck contributions, make sure each dish has a serving spoon and help set them out on the table.

Around 7:45, as people are finishing eating, recruit some helpers to break down the tables and set up chairs for services. Someone (not necessarily you) should take the tablecloths home, wash them, and return them by the next Shabbat service. Put Shabbat candles in candlesticks and smaller candles in the menorah. (The candles are stored in the low cupboard to the right as you face the bimah.) Clean up the main courses, but leave the desserts out for people to nosh on after the services. We do not have a separate oneg after services on a potluck night.

At the end of the evening, sweep the kitchen floors. We now have recycling service at Shir Ami! So collect recyclables separately during the evening. Take out all trash and recycling (cans are to your right as you go out the front door) and place fresh liners in the waste baskets (these are in the tall utility closet next to the dishwasher). Place the lit Shabbat candlesticks in the sink for fire safety. Check to be sure that the stove and oven are off. Turn off all lights in the building and double-check that all doors are locked.

Feel free to ask others to help you with setup and cleanup. Most congregants are happy to lend a hand, and the job can be quite enjoyable when done with friends!
