## President's Message

#### Dear Shir Ami Members and Friends:

I hope you had an enjoyable holiday season and I wish you a Happy New Year!

In December I attended a really interesting meeting regarding Camp Kadima held by Congregation Beth Emek's President, Skylar Cohen. Many of our Shir Ami youth have been campers

or counselors in training at Camp Kadima and as a result have strengthened their Jewish identity and connection to Judaism. Research shows that when our children are involved in meaningful Jewish programs beyond b'nei mitzvah they are more apt to create a life long connection to Judaism.

Let me share with you some important information that I learned at the Camp Kadima meeting that I think you should know:

- Congregation Beth Emek formed Camp Kadima in 1993 for Jewish youth of the East Bay Area with the help of the Jewish Federation's resources.
- The formation of Camp Kadima included the formation of an independent Advisory Committee to oversee camp administration, financials, programming, etc.
- The Jewish Federation has been decreasing the amount of grant money each year with the goal that Camp Kadima will become selfsupporting.
- Currently four entities sponsor Camp Kadima and are members of the Advisory Committee: Beth Emek, Beth Torah, Temple Beth Sholom and Congregation Shir Ami.
- Camp Kadima relies heavily on fundraising to be able to break even each year.

Before this meeting, I didn't realize that Camp Kadima was NOT a part of Beth Emek, or that the proceeds of Kadima fundraising events went directly to Camp Kadima, not to Beth Emek. Now that I understand where the money is going and how important camp is to our children's Jewish connection and identity I am more eager to participate in Camp Kadima fundraising events. I encourage you to participate as well — even if you don't have a camper in your family! Supporting Camp Kadima benefits the future of our local Jewish day camp and our Jewish youth.

At this year's URJ Biennial the URJ leadership presented the Campaign for Youth Engagement: Committing to the Jewish Future. The goal of this campaign is "to dramatically improve the ability of Reform institutions to involve young people in meaningful Jewish life and strengthen post – b'nei mitzvah engagement and retention in synagogues, day schools, camps and youth programs throughout North America." The URJ leadership also presented the Campaign for Youth Engagement Resolution: A 2020 Vision. You can read more about this resolution here:

I don't usually make New Years resolutions but this year I am making an exception. The future of Reform Judaism is very important to me and the key to the future is with our youth. Therefore my resolution is to participate in some of the Camp Kadima fundraising events.

## Rabbinic Interns' Page

Shalom m'Yisrael! Hello from Israel! I'm writing to you this month from Jerusalem, where I have just arrived and where I will be spending two weeks entrenched in the history and traditions of our people.

I arrived in Israel shortly after spending a week in Washington, DC, at the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) Biennial, a conference held every two years with an attendance of over 5,000 Reform Jews from all over the world. The speakers, including Ehud Barak, Israel's Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Defense, Dr. Wendy Mogel, best-selling author of The Blessing of a Skinned Knee and The Blessing of a B-, and even President Barack Obama, and so many more, talked about Israel, the world, and life therein, and even mentioned a word or two of Torah. The Campaign for Youth Engagement was launched to roaring applause, with goals of finding new ways to engage our youth, teens and young adults, and to reach more than the staggering 20% that are currently actively involved. Rabbi Eric Yoffie, outgoing President of the URJ, passed the torch to incoming President Rabbi Rick Jacobs. Rabbi Jacobs presented the three most pressing tasks that he hopes to begin working on as he assumes the role of President:

- 1. Catalyzing congregational change
- 2. Engaging the next generation
- 3. Extending the circles of our responsibility

Rabbi Jacobs spoke with a desire to create anew, to move forward, and to make change. He closed his remarks with the following statement:

"I accept the faith you show in me today with humility and gratitude; I need you with me, however. Together we will seize this moment and shape a better tomorrow for our congregations, our Movement, our people and our world. Help me open our doors, our

minds and our imaginations. Grasp the Torah with me as we carry it out of seclusion. We are the Reform *Movement*, so let's get MOVING!"

Rabbi Jacobs is passionate. He is ready and willing to get moving, to get the job done, and to get the job done right.







#### **LETTERS**

This month we received three letters from community members. The first is from Rose Firestone who shares with us information on her upcoming surgery. The second and third letters are from David Schulberg and Emma Silver.

#### LETTER FROM ROSE FIRESTONE

(in response to a request for more information)

I was diagnosed with Parkinson's (PD) in 1997. PD is a progressive, degenerative



neurological disorder that affects about one in one hundred people, usually over age 60. A lack of dopamine results in various movement difficulties. Standard treatment for PD uses medications to replace or augment the lacking dopamine. Over time, as symptoms progress, the medications are not as effective, and surgery becomes an option.

I am scheduled for Deep Brain Stimulation (DBS) surgery on February 8 & 22. A DBS device (think of it as a pacemaker for the brain), is implanted in each hemisphere of the brain to relieve or abate many of Parkinson's symptoms. Each surgery

takes many hours, so two separate surgeries are performed two weeks apart (and, yikes, I will be awake the entire surgery!). The DBS devise is activated 2 weeks after the second surgery and it takes another 3-6 months to adjust the devise to be most effective. I like to call this upcoming DBS procedure my "Personal Stimulus Package."

Reports on this surgery are extremely positive and my symptoms closely match the profile of someone who can benefit from DBS. The success rate is high, the risks are low, the surgery is reversible, and every person I've met who has had DBS surgery says they would do it again .

We all wish Rose well and are encouraged by the reported results of DBS.

#### LETTER FROM EMMA SILVER

Hi Rose,

My mother mentioned that you wanted a bit of information about my trip and SASSY, our new temple youth group.

#### Here's what I have:

1. SASSY (Shir Ami Sholom Student Youth) is our new Temple Youth Group for Jewish Teens in high school in Castro Valley. We welcome all Jewish teens, belonging to Shir Ami or not, in Castro Valley to be a part of the group, which is through NFTY, the North American Federation for Temple Youth. Our first event, a bowling and movie night was very successful. We had a great time at Castro Village Bowl on December 10th and then headed over to my house for Havdallah and a viewing of "Keeping Up With the Steins". Rabbi Lara joined us and it was a blast!

SASSY Board consists of Spencer Blum-President, Adam Blum- Programming Vice President, myself- Social Action Vice President, Sarah Keil- Communications Vice President, Katherine Kolden- Treasurer, Religious and Cultural Vice President- Rueben Spitzer, and Lior Raskin- Membership Vice President. We are still on the hunt for an Advisor (an adult position) so if anyone is interested, contact me at (650) 483 7438.

2. The program I'm doing in Israel is called NFTY EIE (Eisendrath International Exchange) and is also run through NFTY. We study abroad in Israel, but go to a school specifically for the program. We stay on a Kibbutz about 20 minutes away from Jerusalem for the majority of the trip, with the exception of traveling to Poland and other places in Europe for a week, a trip called Yam el Yam, or Sea to Sea, where we start out at the Mediterranean and make our way to the Dead Sea, Gad'na, where we go into the Israeli Defense Force for a week, and a few other excursions. In addition to all my normal school classes, I will be taking Jewish History and Hebrew while I'm there. Many people I know have come back and said that it changed their life, so I am super excited to go. I leave January 24th and come

home May 29th.

The \$2500 scholarship that I was awarded was also given to me through donors to the NFTY EIE program. I applied for it a month or so ago, and the maximum amount that NFTY gives out is \$2500, so I was incredibly fortunate to have received that amount.

#### **HISTORY OF SHIR AMI (PART 3)**

In our previous articles we spoke about remodeling the building. But what about all the interior details? We had to scurry around to take care of the furnishings, the drapes, the carpeting, the tables and chairs, the Ark, the ritual objects. And of course, the kitchen. All these needed to be ready for our "Grand Opening" on Rosh Hashanah of that first year in the new building, 1966.

After the construction work, it was the women's turn to play a major role. We wasted no time forming ourselves into an organization that we called "The Shir Ami Ladies," or, informally, "The Sals." We divided up the many tasks so that some of us worked on cleaning the kitchen and acquiring supplies, while others set up the library and the classrooms. Then we realized that this was like a family moving into a new home, why not have a kitchen shower?

And what a shower we put on! Now we acquired new and used items to fill the cabinets to overflowing: multiple sets of dishes, silverware, cutlery, tablecloths, kitchen gadgets, coffee makers, Challah boards, wine goblets and whatever else a synagogue can use for its events. The kitchen party became a regular occasion to clean and upgrade existing inventory. Ingrid Weinberg, Rose Levine, Elaine Leavitt, Ann Blank, Judy Ganz and many other devoted "Sals" took part.

Later on, when we started having Russian emigres settle in the Castro Valley area, we found a new mission. The refugees arrived with no money, but an apartment was provided for them by the Jewish Federation. The need was great for beds, sofas, dishes, tables and chairs, for everything to furnish their new homes. Our kitchen showers not only provided them with necessities, but also served as a social outlet to welcome them into our community.

Shir Ami Ladies has evolved into what are today our Sisterhood and Rosh Hodesh groups. Sure, there have been demographic and life style changes since those early years, but basically, the women of Shir Ami have always been there when they were needed. Kol Ha Kavod!

# IRVING BERLIN PLAY IN CASTRO VALLEY

Here's a question. What American song was written by an immigrant and is one of the most successful Christmas songs in history? The song is "I'm dreaming of a White Christmas" (it sold 30 million worldwide), and the song writer is Irving Berlin., a Jew who started life in a Shtetl in abject poverty. The show was featured at the Castro Valley Center for the Arts.

He was born Israel Bailin, one of 8 children. His father was a cantor who traveled around the Ukraine countryside, singing at synagogues whenever they gave him work. He often took his son Israel with him, and in this way the boy was exposed to music at an early age. Then things became tough for Jews, and they were faced with pogroms in the villages in which they lived. Israel claimed that his earliest memory was of lying on the ground, being wrapped in a feather quilt, and watching his little wooden home being burned to the ground, till there was nothing left but ashes.

In great haste, the father smuggled the family out and fled to America. In New York their condition was not much better. Unfortunately there was very little work for a cantor, and they were penniless. They lived in a window-less cold water tenement flat, and the children found whatever work they could in sweat shops and cigarette factories; the eldest daughters even prostituted themselves to support the family.

When Israel was 8 years old his father died, and at age 13 he left home and worked on the streets as newspaper boy and collected small change to give his mother. He remembered sleeping under the tenement steps and eating scraps of food. However, he worked diligently saving his pennies until he had enough to find jobs as singing waiter in bars, where the clientele would reward him with more pennies.

Eventually his singing waiter business paid off, and he began playing roles in Lower East Side musicals. At 18 he ran away from home and became independent. Due to a printer's error, Bailin was changed to Berlin, and he became Irving Berlin. He fell in love with Elin Mackay, a society woman, daughter of Clarence Mackay, head of Post Telegraph Cable company. The father did not approve of his daughter marrying a Jew and was furious when the young couple eloped. He disowned them and gave them nothing- until the market crash of 1929, when he came to Irving and had to beg him for money. Irving and Elin were married 63 years and had four daughters.



In his life time, Irvin Berlin had written a total of more than one thousand five hundred songs including world wide popular hits such as White Christmas, Alexander's Ragtime Band, God Bless America, Easter Parade and more. He died in 1988, at the age of 101, considered by many to be the most prolific and famous song writer in American history.

A Public Health expert was called upon to present a course on rabies to the NYC police. This was precipitated by a

policeman's action in separating two fiercely fighting dogs. The policeman was bitten severely, but, thankfully, neither dog was rabid. Nevertheless, the municipal



authorities felt it was prudent to make the police force aware of the potential hazard in a dogfighting situation.

At the end of the course, the teacher was more than amused by the written answer to one of the questions asked in a test—

"What is rabies and what can be done about it?"

The answer: "Rabies is Jewish priests and nothing can be done about it."

For the Women's Retreat of 2012 we will be reading "Great House" by Nicole Krauss. The book is available in all media formats (print, CD, Audible, Kindle and other readers) and can also be borrowed from the Alameda County Library.

The novel consists of four stories divided among eight chapters, all touching on themes of loss and recovery, and anchored to a massive writing desk that resurfaces among numerous households, much to the bewilderment and existential tension of those in its orbit, among them a lonely American novelist clinging to the memory of a poet who has mysteriously vanished in Chile, an old man in Israel facing the imminent death of his wife of 51 years, and an esteemed antiques dealer tracking down the things stolen from his father by the Nazis. Much like in Krauss's "The History of Love", the sharply etched characters seem at first arbitrarily linked across time and space, but Krauss pulls together the disparate elements, settings, characters, and fragile connective tissue to form a formidable and haunting mosaic of loss and profound sorrow.


