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A SPIN ON THE DREIDEL

When most people think of the Jewish Holiday Chanukah, they think of the dreidel. I thought I would share some information to

help you gain some perspective on its origins and to teach you how to play with this simple yet wonderful spinning top.

Here is a bit of history of the dreidel. Long ago, during the rule of the Greek king Antiochus, Jews were forbidden to study their religion. Jewish children resorted to learning in outlying areas and forests. When the children were studying, they would keep a dreidel nearby to pull out and play in case they were discovered, so that they could pretend to be merely playing games.

A dreidel has one Hebrew letter on each side. Outside of Israel, those letters are: נ (Nun), ג (Gimmel), ה (Hay) and ש (Shin), which stand for the Hebrew phrase "Nes Gadol Haya Sham." This phrase means, "A great miracle happened there [in Israel]." After the State of Israel was founded in 1948 the Hebrew letters were changed for dreidels used in Israel. They became: נ (Nun), ג (Gimmel), ה (Hay) and פ (Pey), which stand for the Hebrew phrase "Nes Gadol Haya Po." This means, "A great miracle happened here."

The miracle referred to in both versions of the Hebrew phrase is the miracle of the Hanukkah oil, which lasted for eight days instead of one.

President's Message

Shalom Shir Ami,

As promised, let me start this month's Message by concluding my preview of coming Shir Ami events for the year. At our Shabbat service on Friday, April 12th, we'll be honoring and thanking all the volunteers that help put on the great events we have throughout the year. We also have a service planned for Friday, April 26th. In May, we'll have a Shabbat service on Friday, May 10th, as well as a special Shavuot/Shabbat service on Friday, 17th. Both of these services will be our last weekends to spend with our Student Rabbis, so I encourage you to attend to thank Aaron and Allie, respectively, for their service to Shir Ami for the year. On Sunday, May 19th, we'll have our end of the year potluck lunch and Annual Congregation Meeting, where we recap what Shir Ami accomplished this year, and preview what's ahead. I hope you'll join us for that special occasion.

The month of November was a challenging one for many in our Congregation. Local elections took place resulting in changes at all levels of Government, some for the better, and others disappointing. At the national level, members like myself found their East Coast families and friends overwhelmed by the effects of Hurricane Sandy and the winter storm that followed. On the global stage, many had feelings ranging from outrage to anxiety to sadness to regret about the violence between Israel and their Palestinian neighbors in Gaza. Certainly, this past month has been among the most tumultuous in recent memory, and has left many of us wondering how to support each other and the community at large.

I am proud to say that several Shir Ami members took this time of doubt as a challenge and promoted action and discussion as our response. Diana Zankowsky, our Religious Committee Co-

Chair, led an unplanned and small yet introspective Shabbat service the evening of November 16th. This service enabled many of us to come together to pray for peace and sanity on the other side of the world, and also contained a serious discussion on what we can do to relay our concerns to those with the power to affect policy, and to improve Jewish-Palestinian relations both within the U.S. and beyond. I much appreciate Diana's leadership on this, and would encourage you to talk to your fellow members to express how this event has impacted your life, and what constructive actions we can take together.

In that vein, on Sunday, November 18th Tom Spitzer led a group of 14 Shir Ami members to volunteer at the Alameda County Food Bank. The bunch of us spent about two and a half hours sorting and packing food that's given out to families in need in our community. The Food Bank relies on volunteers year-round to do the necessary and much appreciated work they do. While I certainly encourage you to join Shir Ami whenever we go as a group, for those with more flexible schedules and weekday time available, please consider donating some of your time as you can throughout the year. This is especially needed in the post-holiday season that starts in January. Here's hoping for a tranquil and festive December and a joyous New Year!

This month, we encounter one of my favorite festivals of light, the holiday of Chanukah. We celebrate this joyous tradition on the twenty-fifth day of the Jewish month of *Kislev*, or evening of December 8th. On each of the eight days of Chanukah, we light the menorah, commemorating the miracle of the oil that lasted for eight days during the time of the Maccabees. That miracle symbolizes for us that God had again protected the Jews, allowing the continuation of the Jewish tradition at a time when we were persecuted. In memory of this, our sages appointed these eight days for annual thanksgiving and for lighting candles. However, God did not simply kindle the oil in the menorah, but the hope of the Maccabees. During the last few weeks we have been bombarded with news from Israel, telling us about the chaos happening in the Jewish homeland. So, at this time in the lives of Jews today, we too need sustaining, we too need kindling. Not of oil, but of hope for peace. At this time we too need a light to guide us through hard times like the Maccabees. Therefore, for this Chanukah celebration, we not only remember the oil that lasted for eight days, but the Jews that lasted for three thousand years!

Technology is constantly changing and we must keep up with the changes in the classroom. "Today, the term "technology" often means computers and the Internet. Ten years ago, "technology" may have meant a bulky video camera or a VHS or BetaMax videotape recorder. In looking at the use of technology in the classroom, an educational technologist uses the broadest definition of technology.

Technology is any instrument or tool that can be used to assist a person in teaching a lesson. Technology can be anything from a pencil and a piece of paper to the electronic superhighway" (V'shinantam, URJ Teachers Newsletter, Technology & the Jewish Classroom - No II, 5763).

If you have a Smartphone, you can check out an app called **iShabbat** where you can learn the Shabbat prayers in a fun new way. It features blessings for candle lighting, Kiddush, Havdalah and much more. You can listen to the melodies of the prayers, and even record your own! It also includes instructional flashcards to reinforce the meaning of the Hebrew in each prayer.

iShma Lite goes beyond basic reading or flashcard programs and provides interactive study tools that help you learn Hebrew prayer. You can learn or refresh reading by singing the Four Questions with your own interactive **iMah Nishtanah. Jewish and Me (JAM) Matching**, is a fast-paced matching game that helps develop cognitive skills and Jewish identity at the same time. By matching the lively cat blowing a shofar, eating hallah, or spinning a dreidel, your kids will have so much fun they won't even know they're learning!

For high school youth, there is **iTorah**. Every month they can receive an e-mail, which will include a piece of Jewish learning, questions (with suggested answers) and practical suggestions for using what was presented in temple, camp or NFTY region; in school and in other extra-curricular activities, like clubs or teams. Have your high school student subscribe to **iTorah** on the URJ website! We are a team: the synagogue and the home, teachers and parents, all teachers and learners. By working together, our children will benefit greatly. It is our duty to give them the tools they will be able to utilize throughout their lifetime.

V'shinantam levanecha. You shall teach them diligently to your children.

DREIDEL, continued from page 1

Here is how to play dreidel:

Any number of people can play. At the beginning of the game each player is given an equal number of "gelt", usually about 10-15. "Gelt", is the Yiddish word for money. Children most frequently use chocolate coins, nuts or pennies to play, but use whatever you like.



At the beginning of each round, every player antes up and puts one piece into the center "pot." They then take turns spinning the dreidel, with the following meanings assigned to each of the Hebrew letters:

.Nun means "nothing" in Yiddish. If the dreidel lands with a nun facing up the spinner does nothing נ

Gimmel means "gantz," in Yiddish which means "everything." If the dreidel lands with the gimmel facing up ג
.the spinner gets everything in the pot

.Hey means "half" in Yiddish. If the dreidel lands with a hey facing up the spinner gets half of the pot ה

Pey means "pay." If the פ Shin means "shtel," in Yiddish for "put in." If you are using an Israeli dreidel, the ש
.dreidel lands with either a shin or a pey facing up the player adds a game piece to the pot
