May 2014 What's Next?

Recent news articles about the situation between the Israelis and the Palestinians give us little reason to hope that any kind of resolution can come to our homeland. Negotiations seem to have gone up in smoke as the Israelis are refusing to release Palestinian prisoners they agreed to, and the Palestinian Authority has asked to join the Geneva Convention, violating an agreement they made with Israel. It seems that both sides are retreating away from the negotiation table and into the hard-line positions they have that prevent them from seeing the other side. Secretary of State John Kerry, in an ominous sign for the fate of these talks, said that the United States' interest in maintaining these talks is finite, and that if no progress was made, that they would back away and move elsewhere. Of course this is understandable, because of the volatile situation in Ukraine, but it is sad that these talks, once heralded as a major break-through for both sides, seem to have disintegrated, leaving us with no achievement.

It is hard to pinpoint exactly what prevents these two parties from coming to an agreement. It would be in both of their interests to strike a peace deal—Israel would gain the peaceful existence it has desired for its entire national history, and the Palestinians would have a state. But something is preventing it. I believe that the sticking point is not actually about the city of Jerusalem or what exactly the borders would look like. The real sticking point is that neither side can let go of the historical narratives that they have held to this point. Both sides believe that the land is theirs. Both sides do not acknowledge the other side's position or respect each other. Many Palestinians do not acknowledge Iewish suffering at the hands of the Nazis, and many Israelis do not acknowledge the pain that the Palestinians have suffered in order to establish the Iewish state. While we might know what an eventual agreement roughly looks like, negotiation is impossible when neither side can accept the narrative of the other as having at least some legitimacy.

The question that remains for us is: what now? Ari Shavit, the author of the much acclaimed book that came out last year (strongly suggested read!) My Promised Land, said on a recent NPR interview that

he hoped that if the talks failed to produce anything, that at least they would come out with a Plan B. What might a Plan B entail? While I was in Israel last year, I heard many stories of both Israelis and Palestinians, and I heard about the struggles they have in day-to-day life. It seems to me that while a major peace deal between Israel and the Palestinians is far from us right now, that there are many things that can be done in the meantime to make the lives of people on both sides better. This Plan B might take the form of an "Economic Reengagement" of sorts. The Israelis could ease passage of the Palestinians between the West Bank and Israel to allow people who had work and family in the state of Israel. This could allow both these Palestinians to resume a level of normalcy in their lives that was disrupted with the construction of the security wall and reduce the level of alienation between Israelis and Palestinians. Israel could also ease passage of trade goods to the Palestinian territories so that their economy can move more smoothly. Helping the Palestinian economy both helps the Palestinian people, because it alleviates the crushing poverty and the astronomically high unemployment rate, and it helps Israel because it can help create a good economic trade partner and it can foster good will between the two sides. These are all things that can be done, I believe, without risking the security interests of Israel and without achieving a peace deal between both sides.

Yes, the peace talks might have failed. But that does not mean that Israel is a hopeless place. There are a lot of things we can do in the meantime. We must always believe in Israel, because it is our homeland, and it will always capture our imaginations. While I recognize the imperfections of Israel, I still love it, and I hope that all of you can share in that love of our home.


