Rabbinic Interns' October Clergy Column

Each month, our Rabbinic Interns take time to share their thoughts with us. This month's column was written by Rabbinic Intern Julie Bressler

The Power of Ritual

The scene is beautiful. Long swaths of fabric and tzitzit blow in the summer wind, blues and whites and purples jump out amongst the layer of tallitot that cover the prayer space. Campers hold each other close as the counselors at URJ Camp Newman create a literal *sukkat shalom*, a shelter of peace over their campers as the community prays *Hashkiveinu*. This ritual elevates the power of this prayer and this moment each and every week. Campers anticipate its arrival and counselors perform its words and actions with vigor as many of them have waited years to be in this position.

I love ritual. I love participating in activities that provide meaning and tangible action for lifecycle and liturgical moments. I feel connected to my ancestors and the Jewish community at large. These rituals have rich and fascinating history and learning the rationale behind them adds to our meaning and practice. Victor Turner, a well-known anthropologist and researcher of religion, stated that community is created in ritual

and these experiences that tie us together to an event and emotion. Judaism completely identifies with this concept and most of our important moments include ritual action.

This year, I hope to expand our understanding of ritual and our personal ritual practice. During most of my visits, I will devote an Adult Education class to learning about and experiencing a certain Jewish ritual. Some of these rituals (challah baking, havdallah) are repeated frequently throughout the Jewish year and are familiar to many of us. Others, such as brit milah (don't worry, we won't be performing this one!) and wrapping t'fillin may be less familiar to us individually, but have an important place in the Jewish story. I hope you will join me in these classes as we learn about these rituals and discuss ways to incorporate some aspect of them into our own families and experiences.

The holidays of Sukkot and Simchat Torah are full of ritual. From shaking the lulav and etrog to dancing with the Torah, we experience these holidays through our senses and with one another. Come join us!

Diana Zankowsky Quoted in "J"

The following text, sent to us by Milt Palmer., is quoted from J magazine. Thanks, Milt!

Press coverage of Mishkan HaNefesh — which means, roughly, "dwelling place of the soul" — has focused on its progressive elements, including LGBT-friendly changes in language; radical liturgy, such as prayers of protest; and commentary and readings from a diverse range of thinkers, writers and poets.

That's what attracted Congregation Shir Ami in Castro Valley. "We were early adopters of Mishkan T'filah," the Shabbat and daily prayerbook released in 2007, said **Diana Zankowsky**, co-chair of the synagogue's religious committee. "We've been waiting a long time to get rid of the masculine God language" used in previous machzors, she said. "That was a driver, the gendered language. We've been waiting to move on past that ever since we moved on to Mishkan T'filah."

Rabbi Laurence Elis Milder spoke of a similar motivation. At his synagogue, Congregation Beth Emek in Pleasanton, which also uses Mishkan T'filah, he saw an "opportunity for our High Holy Days to match the feel of the rest of the year."

School is on Sunday's, usually about three weeks a month, from September to May The first day of school is on September 20th and the first Tot Talk is September 27th



Our multi-age school program provides a fun environment where our children learn about Jewish practices, culture, holidays and experience the joy of living Jewishly. We have small classes and new this year, we will be having electives, such as drama, arts and crafts and cooking. We try to make Jewish education fun and make our Religious and Hebrew schools a place where children want to be and look forward to attending.

Hebrew classes are generally for children in 3rd grade and up, but can be made available depending upon the abilities of the child. Older children are also welcome in the school, without any prior Jewish education. Many of our children continue on beyond Bar or Bat Mitzvah through confirmation and become teaching assistants and teachers in our school.

For the little ones in the family, we have a free Tot Talk program, which is designed for children, ages 0-5 and their parents / caregivers to learn a little bit about being Jewish and to socialize and have fun. We meet one Sunday a month for the last hour of school.

We encourage parent participation in our school and family members often join us for parent education and holiday celebrations. We will have a shabbaton sleepover for Sukkot this year as well as field trips planned that all families can attend. Throughout the year, we have family friendly events and children's shabbat services.



The education of our children is central to our mission as a community and is supported by all of our members. To enroll in the school, your family needs to become a member of the congregation. We have an extremely affordable introductory membership fee of \$300 for families if they would like to join and enroll their children in school.
