COMMITTEE SPOTLIGHT

(FORMERLY KNOWN AS "PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE")

Committees and the volunteers who form those committees, provide orgaizational support for our synagogue's activities. In order to better understand the various committees and the role they play at Shir Ami, we will highlight a committee each month in lieu of a "President's Message." This month's column is written by Tom Spitzer, Social Action Committee Chair.

Social Action at Congregation Shir Ami – 2016-17 Program

Congregation Shir Ami has a rich history of activism and involvement in community affairs. In conjunction with the Board adopting a more formal leadership model this year, we are trying to formalize our Social Action activities a bit. The committee, consisting of Ruth Hartman, Daryl Berman, Julie Greenfield, and myself, met in July with an eye to what we want to accomplish for 2016-17. I'll briefly outline that here.

Shir Ami has a number of relationships with local organizations working on economic security and social justice issues in the community. The newest of these is the Eden Area Interfaith Council, which was formed as a vehicle for promoting understanding and freedom of religious expression by area congregations in response to the anti-Muslim hate crime at Lake Chabot last year. Our ongoing east bay partners include the Alameda County Community Food Bank (ACCFB), Eden United Church of Christ (and its Comida Para Cherryland Food Pantry), and South Hayward Parish. With respect to the food programs, we coordinate the annual high holidays food drive, and a pre-Thanksgiving food sorting event at ACCFB (which will take place on November 20 this year).

By the way, in addition to the committee members, there are quite a few others who do important work on our behalf, including Diana Zankowsky who is our primary liaison to the Food Bank, and Harriet Skelly who plays the same role with respect to Comida Para Cherryland.

In addition to local organizations we work with the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ)'s Religious Action

Center (RAC) which promotes and provides material supporting social action programs of interest to the broader Reform Jewish community. This year we are exploring the possibility of getting involved with programs of ReformCA which is a joint campaign of "Just Congregations" (which is a separate URJ program), RAC, and the Central Conference of American Rabbi's Peace and Justice Committee to coordinate on social action issues that affect California. We have also discussed the possibility of working on initiatives launched by "Bend the Arc, a Jewish Partnership for Justice".

As sort of an adjunct to maintaining all these relationships, we coordinate Shir Ami's participation in a number of community activities, including the recent Castro Valley Pride day, the annual Hayward Martin Luther King day observance, and the Days of Diversity activities at Castro Valley High School, and starting this year, the Rowell Ranch Rodeo Parade! It's great to get broad participation from the Shir Ami community in these events.

At our organizational meeting in July, the committee considered ways to take more responsibility, by identifying and recommending programs worthy of support and coordinate that support through education and Tzedakah programs. We have been evaluating ballot initiatives and RAC programs and want to identify programs that we could support for maybe three month periods during the year. During those periods, we would do some education around the initiative and try to raise awareness and funds. This could involve supporting Mitzvah projects, presentations in Religious School, etc.

As you can see we have a fairly ambitious agenda set out for ourselves, and could always use more participation. Anybody interested in making some of this happen, or helping us choose where to put our energy, please get in touch with me.

RABBINIC INTERNS' CLERGY COLUMN

This month's Rabbinic Interns' column is submitted by Student Rabbi Liora Alban

My name is Liora Alban and I am excited to be serving as one of Congregation Shir Ami's student rabbis for the 2016-2017 academic year! As the year begins, we will jump full force together into the Hebrew month of *Elul*. This month preceding the High Holidays is a special time in which Jews traditionally engage in the challenging work of introspection, realization, and improvement. The idea is that through the completion of this work, we will realize our shortcomings of the past year and will seek change. This will allow us to become closer to others, to our truest selves, and to God so that we are ready to begin the new year afresh. One habit of Jews during this month is to recite Psalm 27 on each day of *Elul*.

God is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? God is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

These opening lines of Psalm 27 present something true about growth: It can often incite fear. While the known is comforting and manageable, the unknown can be scary and challenging. Pushing ourselves into new territories means putting forth a certain amount of effort and being open to the possibility of failure.

This past summer, I worked as a Unit Head at URJ Camp Newman. I decided to work at Camp because I believed it would be a fruitful learning experience.

I was a camper at Camp Newman, I had never worked on Camp Newman's staff and I had never held such responsibility while at Camp. I was looking forward to gaining experience in Jewish education, prayer, emotional care, and all around leadership. When I arrived at Camp, I realized that I was very nervous to begin the job! I was afraid that I was not going to be able to juggle all the tasks that needed to get done, and that I was going to make a mistake that would hurt others' camp experiences.

In the end, camp proved to be an exceptional learning opportunity. I gained the experience I was hoping for, but additionally came away from the summer with new relationships and fond memories to last my lifetime. I want to end with a confession. Just as I was nervous to begin my summer at Camp Newman, so too am I nervous to begin my work at Congregation Shir Ami. Although I know that Shir Ami is a warm, accepting, and spiritual Jewish community, the fact that it is new also makes me somewhat anxious. I trust though that by the end of this year, I will look back at my time at Shir Ami with fond memories. strong relationships, and new skills, just as I look back at my time at Camp Newman. At that point, Shir Ami will no longer represent the unknown, but it will represent a home where we grew together. I look forward to seeing how this growth process happens over the next year!


