COMMITTEE SPOTLIGHT: RELIGIOUS COMMTTEE

This month's column is written by Diana Zankowsky and highlights Shir Ami's Religious Committee

Some thoughts from your Religious Committee as the New Year of 5777 arrives

The High Holy days involve a lot of preparation for many Jews. We bake (or buy) honey cakes. We write and send greeting cards with wishes for L'Shana Tova. Some of us even go out and buy new clothes for Rosh Hashanah. And then there is the internal preparation for Yom Kippur, thinking back on this past year, determining how to do better in this coming year.

The Religious Committee at Shir Ami also has a lot of preparations to complete before the High Holy days begin. We want to create the best possible High Holy day experience for all of us. We remove the everyday covers on the Torahs and replace them with the white covers; we polish (and repair, if necessary) all of the silver ornaments. We make sure that the Torah is rolled to the proper place. We select the readers for many of the English readings and the Hebrew prayers and for the Torah readings in both Hebrew on Yom Kippur and the translations into English. And those of us that blow the shofar, start practicing.


This year will be the first year that we will use the new Mishkan HaNefesh for **all** services. We are very happy with the new machzorim (the Hebrew word for the prayer books for these holidays). The translations are gender-neutral, the page layouts are very easy on the eyes and there is an amazing amount of new material in English! Lots of alternative readings, just like in our everyday prayer books. It was so hard to choose. But we had to choose, since it isn't possible to read everything.

Once we've selected the readings, then the student rabbis and the cantor decide upon the musical selections. For each song or sung prayer, we decide who plays guitar, who leads the singing and whose version of music we will use. Our goal is to provide the congregation with an uplifting spiritual experience, some parts of which are familiar and some are totally new, that truly bring in the New Year of 5777 in ways that move each of us. For us on the committee, the process and this work brings us a great deal of pleasure and joy and certainly for me, raises my level of anticipation for the holidays.

I want to personally thank each of the members of the team that worked on the services: Student rabbis Julie Bressler, Bryan Zive and Liora Alban, Cantor Judy Caplan Ginsburgh, the co-chairs of the Religious Committee, David Schulberg and myself, Judy Ganz and Harriet Skelly.

Finally, from the Religious Committee, I am extending our heartfelt wishes for a *L'Shana Tova U'metuka*, a good and sweet New Year.

TZEDAKAH SPOTLIGHT: FOOD SECURITY

Your Social Action Committee is launching Tzedakah Spotlight. Every 3-4 months, we will present an area of tikkun olam for all of us to learn about and consider supporting. We hope to creatively connect this spotlight with tzedakah/giving, community mitzvah projects, school and youth programming, adult education, and more.

Our Tzedakah Spotlight for Fall, 2016/5777, is on Food Security. Of course the Alameda County Food Bank (ACCFB) is the "mothership" of food support in Alameda County. The Food Bank serves 1 in 5 Alameda County residents by distributing food through a network of 240 food pantries, soup kitchens, and other community organizations, as well as direct-distribution programs including Children's Backpack and Mobile Pantry. The food pantries that receive distributions from ACCFB include the South Hayward Parish (SHP) Emergency Food Pantry and Comida Para Cherryland at Eden United Church of Christ in Hayward. Our support focus is on these two food pantries, ACCFB itself, and Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger. You'll find details on these local, regional, and Jewish food aid and advocacy organizations below.

The first program in this Tzedakah Spotlight on Food Security is our annual High Holy Days drive for contributions, which we split between the SHP Food Pantry and Comida. This year we are encouraging monetary contributions, since they are more highly leveraged, and, frankly, easier for us to handle. You can drop off a check with a Board officer or Tom Spitzer, Social Action Chair, at one of the High Holy Days services.

Later in the autumn we will be doing our annual volunteer day at ACCFB on Sunday November 20, so mark that date on your calendars. We will be looking into organizing additional programs along the way, and would be happy to hear ideas from the membership on how to shine a brighter spotlight on the issue of Food Security.

<u>Alameda County Community Food Bank</u> (ACCFB),<u>www.accfb.org</u>

The Alameda County Community Food Bank, in operation since 1985, is the hub of a vast collection and distribution network that provides food for 240 nonprofit agencies in Alameda County, including food pantries, soup kitchens, child-care centers, senior centers, after-school programs and other communitybased organizations, as well as its own directdistribution programs. In 2014, the Food Bank distributed 25 million meals, and more than half of the food was fresh fruits and vegetables. Their goal is to ensure every food insecure child, adult and senior in Alameda County knows where their next meal is coming from. Shir Ami members participate in volunteer work days at the Food Bank, sorting and stocking food items in the distribution warehouse.

South Hayward Parish Emergency Food

Pantry http://southhaywardparish.org/food-pantry/ Congregation Shir Ami is a longtime member of South Hayward Parish, an interfaith organization dedicated to serving the needs of Hayward by working for justice through empowering the community. They actively advocate for the rights and dignity of all people, regardless of sexual orientation, religion, ethnicity, race, or geographic origin. SHP's Emergency Food Pantry program provides emergency food for individuals and families in need of assistance.

<u>Comida Para Cherryland</u> at Eden United Church of Christ in Hayward <u>http://www.edenucc.com/how-to-get-involved/community-outreach/companerasos-ministry/comida-para-cherryland/</u> Eden Church's just-in-time food pantry, Comida para Cherryland, serves around 225 families per month, 90% of whom live in the Cherryland community. As part of Shir Ami's longtime partnership with Eden Church, members of Congregation Shir Ami volunteer regularly at the Comida, which operates two Wednesdays each month.

Mazon: A Jewish Response to Hunger <u>www.mazon.org</u> MAZON's advocacy works to ensure that hungry people have access to nutritious food today and demands government policies assure no one goes hungry tomorrow. For 30 years, Mazon has been building an army of anti-hunger advocates to achieve systemic change. Mazon supports the advocacy work of organizations advancing long-term solutions in communities in the United States and Israel. They have a network of nearly 1,000 synagogue who mobilize their congregations and their communities to help end the injustice of hunger.
