RABBINIC INTERNS' CLERGY COLUMN

We have the honor of reading from *Parashat Yitro* throughout the month of February this year! It comes as no coincidence that, during this month, I also share the honor of serving our community through jury duty. When we receive our summons in the mail, so many of us think to ourselves, "I wonder how I can get out of this"? While I am not normally an exception, it has been over six years since I've last served and I became excited at this possibility of seeing our judicial system at work.

How do *Parashat Yitro* and jury duty compare? With a few small changes, Yitro, the Priest of Midian, suggests that Moses use a justice system similar to one that we know today. The model is built on a hierarchy according to the severity of the issues. Minor issues are dealt with by the lower court, and more serious issues are dealt with by Moses himself. Only at that point, after Moses has established a justice system, the people are given the Ten Commandments and accept it.

Why now? Why is the Torah given to Israel at this point, and why is it suddenly necessary?

Rabbi Uri Ayalon suggests the people of Israel, deciding to accept a fair and equitable human justice system, was the moment for which God had waited. From God's perspective, the Israelites can only receive Torah once they're worthy of it through self-sustainable basic values and principles set down by a justice system.

When presented with this new system, the Israelites

respond *na'aseh v'nishmah*, *we will do as we shall hear"*. *Na'aseh:* we will do our part in upholding our own morals, and *Nish'mah:* we will hear God's suggestions of morality that provide the foundations that we will accept and institute today. In other words, once we know and understand the limits of our action, we can work together as a community to uphold it lawfully. This allows us to function as a moral society, one where we are responsible for one another's actions.

Our American democratic system is only as strong as its citizens allow. We decide when ideology turns into reality. Moses felt the burdens of making unilateral decisions and needed help from his community to sustain a just society. No one person makes **the** difference, but one person can make **a** difference, which is why I am so excited to serve on Jury Duty! It's my privilege to serve our community and uphold the responsibility of a system that makes our democracy so unique.

The next time you receive a jury summons in the mail, use it as a reminder for your communal responsibility and make a difference!

ROSH CHODESH

About 14 members and guests of the Shir Ami Sisterhood met at Shir Ami on Thursday night, January 26, to welcome the new month of *Shevat* with lighting candles, reciting blessings for the new month, Torah readings, singing, and, of course, sharing food. The month of *Shevat* is identified in the Mazzaroth (constellations) with "D'Li", a vessel of water, and thus connected to Miriam, who is also known as a "vessel of water". Miriam's well was a porous boulder, said to have been created at twilight of the first Shabbat of Creation; it was the source of water that followed the Israelites through their wandering in the wilderness until Miriam's death. To further remember Miriam, the Shir Ami "sisters" crafted symbolic timbrels from bamboo hoops and lace cloth, and sang Miriam's song, among others, led by the voice and music of Debbie

Friedman. The event was led by Barbara-Ann Lewis, with Sara and Marlene Lamnin supplying the refreshments.
