## President's Message

Dear Congregation Shir Ami Members and Friends,

Last week, I was very pleased to accept a new membership application. This individual has attended Friday night services and adult education at Shir Ami regularly for several years, has helped out at many of our special events and holiday celebrations, and has formed caring relationships with many members of our community. We are delighted that he has decided to become a member of Shir Ami. Would it surprise you to know that our newest member is not Jewish?

Here's what our bylaws have to say about the criteria for membership in Congregation Shir Ami, "*Anyone who subscribes to the basic tenets of Judaism shall be eligible for membership.*" Unlike most other synagogues (including Reform congregations), our bylaws do not require that at least one member of each household be a Jew. We welcome any person who wants to join with us in living a Jewish life in Jewish community.

This spirit of inclusiveness has long been one of the hallmarks of our congregation. I asked Hillie Levine, a founding member and past President of our congregation, about the history of this philosophy. Hillie recalled a very well attended community meeting many years ago, at which the issue of participation by non-Jews was vigorously debated. There were some who felt that religious precedent required that certain kinds of ritual participation be reserved only for members of the Jewish faith. But the inclusive position prevailed, in part by citing several passages from Torah, including Numbers 15:15:

*One ordinance shall be both for you of the congregation, and also for the stranger that sojourneth with you, an ordinance forever in your generations: as ye are, so shall the stranger be before the Lord.*

Since that time, Shir Ami has allowed and encouraged (with limited restrictions) participation by non-Jewish members in ritual and leadership activities.

Today, about a third of our member households include at least one non-Jewish adult, and more than half of our young people are growing up in mixed-heritage Jewish families. Gentile members of Shir Ami are among the most active and visible supporters of our community life. Many participate not only on behalf of their Jewish children or partners, but also to meet their own needs for spiritual connection, friendship, and community involvement.

There is so much more to say on this topic, but right now I want to focus on one point. As Reform Judaism becomes more and more inclusive, we need to find ways to meet the needs of all our congregants for Jewish literacy and continuous learning. We want all to be able to participate fully in worship, to support the Jewish education of our young people, and to enjoy the depth of wisdom contained in Jewish history, culture, and texts.

Starting next fall, Congregation Shir Ami plans to offer a special class for adults who would like to learn more about Judaism in a systematic way. The class will be open to all: non-Jewish members of our community, people raised Jewish who would like to deepen their understanding of Judaism, and Jews-by-choice who want to continue their Jewish learning. The class will be taught by our Rabbinic interns on Saturdays throughout the year (details to follow).

We are very excited about this upcoming program, and hope you will consider making time to attend.

## Rabbi's Corner

### *Bekah Stern*

I am writing this month with two different items for your consideration. The first is an invitation to an event happening on Sunday February 11<sup>th</sup>, and the second is an announcement about exciting plans in the works for next year. I would *very much* appreciate your feedback on those plans!

It has been such a pleasure to share with you my passion for our peoples' rich heritage and rituals over the last several months. On Shabbat February 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Jewish people will celebrate the new year of the trees, called *Tu B'Shevat*. Each year at this time, we turn our attention to the natural world and the to the beginning of the transition from winter to spring. We often plant trees, both here and/or in Israel.

I am excited that this time of year brings an opportunity for me to share with you another of my passions—environmental activism. During our annual focus on the earth, it has become increasingly important that we spend some time reflecting on the ways that our daily actions have an impact on the natural world.

To that end, I would like to invite you to join the *b'nai mitzvah* and confirmation classes on **Sunday, February 11<sup>th</sup> at 10:45am** as we view the film [An Inconvenient Truth](#). I hope to begin a conversation about what Judaism says about our stewardship for God's creations, and to engage our youth—our people's and humanity's future—in thinking seriously about these issues. If you have any questions or thoughts about this event, please don't hesitate to contact me. I look forward to seeing you there!

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In conversation with many of you over the last few months, I have heard that most of you have never been to Israel and that for those who have been, it has been several years since you were last there. As many of you know, I spent an incredible year living in Jerusalem and traveling around the country last year. After hearing that so many of you have never experienced Israel firsthand, I was motivated to act to change that. On the joint congregational family retreat in early November, I continued this conversation about visiting Israel with you and with members of Congregation Beth Emek. Since that time, Rabbi Rick Winer of CBE and I have begun the preliminary stages of planning a joint congregational Israel trip. We are thrilled to welcome first-timers and veterans alike, families with children and singles, the very young and the not-so-very young. I am working with a number of individuals and organizations to create an exciting itinerary that is as cost-effective as possible, as well as looking into possible grants and sources of funding to subsidize the cost of the trip. I will work with anyone who is interested in coming with us to find ways to make it financially viable.

Finding a time that both Rabbi Rick and I are available to co-lead this trip was a challenge. The only block of time we could come up with is during Passover of next year, that is Friday April 18<sup>th</sup> through Sunday April 27<sup>th</sup>, 2008. We understand that this does not fall during a school vacation, so, before we move forward in our planning, we need to have an idea of how many people would join us if we scheduled a trip during these approximate dates. ***Please let me know as soon as possible if you are interested in possibly joining us.*** It's sure to be an incredible week of fun, bonding, and growth. I very much hope that many of you will come along.

Sunday School at Shir Ami continues to be a dynamic environment with a new plan being developed by our confirmation class: Starting February 4<sup>th</sup> with a Tu B'Shevat themed program the girls in the confirmation class, Sophia Blum, Sarah Gilchriese, Carolyn Gilchriese, Hana Hartman, Shashana Markus, and Lola Ridgell, will be bringing the chug or elective period back to our program.

The basic idea is that after snack on selected Sunday mornings the students in the Kindergarten through B'nai Mitzvah classes will be able to choose between an art, drama, or Tikkun Olam (community service) elective to participate in. As an introduction on February 4<sup>th</sup> all students will have a chance to get a taste of each elective. The confirmation students remember this program as "an important part of our development as Jewish youth." They have worked hard developing a plan to make this possible for our present Sunday School configuration. This idea has originated and will be carried forth because of the enthusiasm of the confirmation class, but they will also have the able assistance of our Shir Ami teaching staff.

Tu B'Shevat activities have been going on around the school recently. The members of Jan Dombrower's 3rd and 4th grade class had a great discussion of the different types of fruits recognized at Tu B'Shevat. Ask them if an apple is a fruit that you eat entirely or a fruit that you only eat the outside of. Preschoolers through 4<sup>th</sup> graders all decorated various planters, and the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders did some clean-up in the yard.

The B'nai Mitzvah class is hard at work on Bar and Bat Mitzvah preparations. Rachel Markus will become Shir Ami's first Bat Mitzvah this school year on Saturday, Feb. 3<sup>rd</sup>. She was busy practicing chanting from the Torah, and it sounded great.

### **Combatants For Peace Event, February 4th, 2006**

Brit Tzedek v'Shalom, the Jewish Alliance for Justice and Peace, is a national organization with the mission to educate and mobilize American Jews in support of a Negotiated, two-state resolution of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. The "Combatants for Peace" movement was started by Israelis and Palestinians who had taken part in the cycle of violence between the two peoples. After brandishing weapons for so many years, these former combatants decided to put down their guns and instead fight for peace.

Learn more about this proposal for peace on Sunday, February 4, 12 to 2pm at the Grand Lake Theatre, 3200 Grand Avenue, Oakland. Tickets are \$5. Speakers include:

Shimon Katz, former member of the an elite Israeli Defense Forces combat unit before studying non-violence. While he continued to serve a few weeks each year in the army he recalls "I tried finding a bridge between the obligation to 'serve' the country and my inner voice that told me that isn't the way to act." He says he served in the army "refusing to carry a gun, until I realized that serving in a combat unit is not something I believe in any more."

Sulaiman Al Hamri, Palestinian coordinator for Combatants for Peace. He spent four-and-a-half years in Israeli prisons for his involvement in anti-occupation protests and demonstrations, before deciding to pursue a non-violent approach to resolving the conflict.

They did receive a grant from FEMA to purchase additional food not available through FDA, Hope for the Heart, and community donations. The grant is not available to them in 2007, yet the need is consistent.

Remember Shir Ami's food basket

Hey everyone,

This year for **Purim** our youth group, **EDJY**, will be combining two Purim mitzvot: *mishloah manot* and *matanot la'evyonim*. The mitzvah of *mishloah manot*, also called *shlach manos*, requires that Jews send each other packages of food which include at least two different items and are ready to be eaten. This is meant to encourage **love and friendship** and commemorate the friendship between Esther and Mordecai. The second mitzvah, *matanot la'evyonim*, means “gifts to the poor.”

To fulfil these mitzvot we will be selling **EDJYgrams** (consisting of candy, a soda, and a personalized note) for delivery to our teens at our **Purim Game Day on March 3<sup>rd</sup>**. **Proceeds** above the price of the food **will be donated to charity**, most likely to the local food bank.

EDJYgrams can be purchased for **\$3 each or two for \$5** by teens or by adults who would like an EDJYgram sent to their teen. An order form will be available soon. Teens who cannot attend the Purim Game Day, which will be from 1:00-5:00 at Congregation Beth Emek, can pick up their EDJYgrams at the next youth group event.
