President's Message

Dear Shir Ami members and friends,

Our Movement, the Union for Reform Judaism, is in the midst of a revolutionary reorganization. Some of you have been following these changes as they have been reported in the press or communicated via various emails, but in case it's all new to you, here's an overview of what's happening.

The URJ is the largest, fastest growing, and most vibrant segment of organized Jewry. However, many of the institutional structures of our Movement had been in place for over half a century and were seriously outdated. Even before the current economic "downturn," the URJ had been actively exploring options for organizational transformation. The crisis in the economy made the need more urgent, and the URJ moved quickly this spring to adopt and now implement sweeping structural changes.

The Union has closed its 14 regional offices (eliminating the jobs of many dedicated staff) and is replacing them with three Service Centers. Each congregation now has a "Congregational Representative" who will be the primary contact for the congregation and will be responsible for ensuring the congregation has the resources and specialists it needs. We will also have access to experts in a wide variety of specialties via the new Congregational Consulting Group.

There will be a stronger emphasis on people, relationships, and affinity, and less on geography. Congregations are being grouped by shared demographics, similar sizes, and interests through affinity groups to facilitate congregational networking and sharing of ideas and resources.

Many of the familiar URJ resources will continue, including NFTY youth programs, URJ Camp Newman/Swig and other camps, and *Reform Judaism* magazine. The Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, the seminary that trains Reform rabbis, cantors, and educators and provides our rabbinic interns, is undergoing its own budget crisis and organizational soul-searching. Although the final results of that process are not yet clear, at this time we expect the Los Angeles campus to remain open.

What does all this mean to us at Shir Ami? Even though the URJ may not be an obvious presence in our daily lives, its resources and its leadership lie at the core of our Shir Ami community. It is woven into much of what we are, from our rabbinic interns to our beautiful new prayerbooks, to our youth groups and camps, to our school curriculum, to our connection with the influential social justice work of the Religious Action Center, and more. We benefit from the support and direction that the URJ provides, and we want Reform Judaism to thrive and grow in North America, Israel, and worldwide.

Adult Education

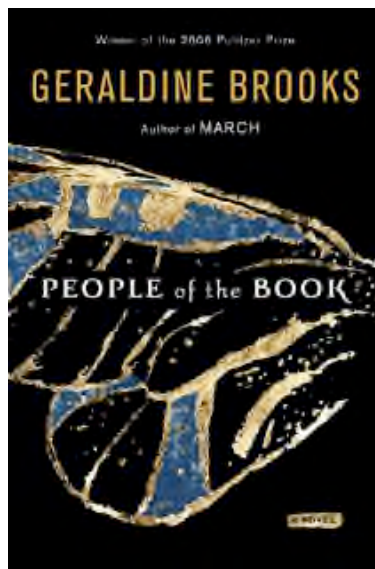

It's summertime in Castro Valley and the adult education offerings will swing into a different gear.

Congregation Shir Ami will offer a book discussion session on Geraldine Brooks' latest novel, "People of the Book", published in 2008.

Here is a brief summary of the novel:

Inspired by the true story of a mysterious codex known as the Sarajevo Haggadah, *People of the Book* is a sweeping adventure through five centuries of history. From its creation in Muslim-ruled, medieval Spain, the illuminated manuscript makes a series of perilous journeys: through Inquisition-era Venice, fin-de-siecle Vienna, and the Nazi sacking of Sarajevo.



In 1996, Hanna Heath, an Australian rare-book expert, is offered the job of a lifetime: analysis and conservation of the famed manuscript, which has been rescued once again from Serb shelling during the Bosnian war. Priceless and beautiful, the book is one of the earliest Jewish volumes ever to be illuminated with figurative paintings. When Hanna, discovers a series of tiny artifacts in its ancient binding—an insect wing fragment, wine stains, salt crystals, a white hair—she becomes determined to unlock the book's mysteries.

We'll meet at Shir Ami on Sunday, July 12th, from 10:00 to 11:30 am for a nosh and a discussion of this amazing tale, available in audio, paperback and hardcover.

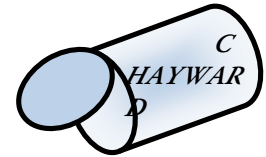

- f* Develop a training system and resource bank for feeding program volunteers and participants.
- f* Research existing homelessness resource center models, gathering best practices and cautionary tales.
- f* Open and maintain Homelessness/ Low Income Service Center
