Dear Shir Ami Members and Friends:



The Haftarah Commentary

Did you know that every week in the Jewish calendar not only has an assigned portion of Torah but also has an assigned portion of Haftarah?

What is Haftarah? It is a selected reading from Prophets or Writings that complements the reading from Torah. Thanks to Judy Ganz, the library at Shir Ami has been gifted with The Haftarah Commentary by W. Gunther Plaut. This commentary comes from the URJ Press and contains a comprehensive new translation, by Chaim Stern, of the weekly selections from the Prophets and Writings, complete with meticulously cantillated Hebrew text, commentary and translations, essays, gleanings from sources modern and ancient, notes, glossary, bibliography, and additional selections for use as alternatives to the traditional haftarot. This book is a welcome addition to our library and will be shelved in the bimah area with the other sacred texts.

February Bat Mitzvah

Sophia Silver will become a Bat Mitzvah on February 19th. She told us about herself in an interview with Rose Levine.

Sophia was born at Stanford Hospital in Feb. 1998 and lived in Redwood Shores until the



age of five, when she and her mother Lisa and older sister Emma moved to Castro Valley. The family joined Shir Ami soon after that. She now attends seventh grade at Canyon Middle School. When she was in fifth grade, Sophia was chosen by the Castro Valley School District as Student of the Year.

Sophia has a wide variety of interests and talents. Among others, they are singing, playing the guitar, participating in choir, doing sports, and playing tennis. She especially enjoys acting in musicals, and has performed in *Oliver, West Side Story* and *Fiddler on the Roof.*

She also has experience in volunteering. Once she took part in raising funds to buy a goat for a village in Africa. The goat provided milk and helped to feed the children in the village. For her Bat Mitzvah project, she regularly works with her dad, Adam Silver, on "Riders for Health," a non-profit organization that sponsors fundraising events to bring motorcycles and medicines to villages in underdeveloped countries.

When Sophia is called to the Torah at her Bat Mitzvah, she will be called by her Hebrew name, Malkah Liorah. She is excited about reading and chanting her portion, Vayakhel, from Exodus 35:1-38:20. In the portion, Moses is bringing together the community of Israel, and is giving them the laws of Shabbat. Sophia feels that tradition and community are still important today, and that Shir Ami is unique in its sense of connection with the community. She loves the congregation, and especially her Shir Ami friends.

Cheesy Egg Casserole from Ruth Hartman

Prepare one day ahead.

6 eggs

1/2 cup flour

1 tsp baking powder

1 cup milk

3 oz. cream cheese

8 oz. small curd cottage cheese

10 oz. shredded Monterrey Jack

6 oz. medium Cheddar

1/8 tsp salt

1 bunch green onions

12 oz. sliced mushrooms, sautéed in butter and

drained

diced jalapeno peppers to taste (optional)

paprika

In a large bowl, whisk eggs

Add flour, baking soda, and milk

Cut cream cheese in small cubes.

Add it, along with cottage cheese, to mixture.

Add remaining ingredients except paprika.

Butter a 9x13 inch casserole dish.

Pour in mixture. Sprinkle with

paprika. Refrigerate overnight. Before cooking,

let casserole sit out for one hour to come to room

temperature.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cook 45 minutes.
