### President's Message

President's Message for October 2013 Bulletin

Shalom Shir Ami,

Trick or Treat! For me, the month of October has always been symbolized by the icons of the holiday of Halloween. Images of toothy smiling jack o'lanterns, floating ghosts, and green-skinned witches riding broomsticks fill my mind during this time of year, as they have since I was a child. Then, my parents struggled between wishing to fulfill my desire for fun, treats and the camaraderie of my non-Jewish friends, and wanting me to embrace my Jewish heritage and culture and not participate in the festivities. They never really came to a formal resolution on the issue, instead, allowing me to make my own decision once I became a teen (hint: this decision involved candy corn).

We should acknowledge that our mission statement guides us to be inclusive, and to welcome interfaith families. To me, welcoming those of other faiths means respecting the customs and supporting the values of those raised in other faiths. This issue was brought up at a recent Religious Committee meeting, at which a request was made to keep the weekend before Halloween clear of Shir Ami child-centered events in order for interfaith families to celebrate how they wish and not "miss out" on any congregational activities. I'm gratified to say that the Committee accommodated this request with little debate, thus the reason for our Kids Shabbat taking place on October 11th. This simple example shows the respect we exhibited when discussing aspects of other faiths, and our ability to make decisions that reflect this respect.

A deeper question to ask is: is the celebration of Halloween appropriate or not for American Jews? I found some guidance on this issue on-line in a response from Jeffrey Goldwasser, a Reform Jewish Rabbi serving Congregation Beth Israel in North Adams, MA. Rabbi Goldwasser pointed out that Halloween has its origins as a Celtic harvest holiday, and was only later appropriated as the

eve prior to All Saints Day. When Halloween came to America, it was again transformed into an amalgam of symbols from the Celtic holiday, the Christian custom of traveling from house to house, harvest symbols (such as the jack o'lantern), and contemporary symbols of fright and death. As Rabbi Goldwasser puts it, "The holiday, as it is observed in America, has entirely lost its connection to any religious meaning or observance." He goes on to give the okay for those Jews who wish to celebrate the holiday to do so, just as they already celebrate Thanksgiving and Independence Day.

As with any Jewish issue, one can find a counteropinion that seems equally as valid. Salomon Gruenwald, a Conservative Rabbi at Congregation HEA in Denver, CO, dissuades Jews from participating in Halloween as "... (it) glorifies the occult and makes death terrifying. That's not a very Jewish value. We see death as a part of life and not something to be feared." Regarding the point that Halloween has gone beyond its Celtic and Christian origins and has acquired a secular meaning, Rabbi Gruenwald says "Origins are an important component (to Jewish objections to Halloween), but at the same time we have to recognize that Halloween has evolved into a secular American holiday. It's a model of pluralism and multiculturalism. But as Jews, it's not what we do." Rabbi Gruenwald does go on to say that there's nothing wrong in supporting our non-Jewish friends and neighbors with their celebration of Halloween by handing out candy. He states, "We can still be generous, and not shutter our windows."

While I didn't expect to find a definitive answer in my on-line searches on this topic, several themes resonated with every new opinion I found. As I already mentioned, respect is paramount in any discussion on Halloween or the broader topic of Jews participating in non-Jewish holidays. It's important that we acknowledge the other-faith origins of such holidays, and explore the values those origins reflect. Odds are, those values can also be found within Judaism, which can lead to conversation about our holidays and customs that promote them. Also, it's equally important to

communicate with your family about what participation in Halloween means to you and, if you don't want children trick-or-treating, why not. I realize that this is sometimes not easy to do, but children learn a lot from their caregivers'



actions so perhaps action is what's called for, and not just discussion.

These elements – respect and communication – are at the heart of Reform Judaism. I encourage you to use them when making these decisions, not to mention the harder ones. Until next month...



### Help South Hayward Parish

South Hayward Parish (SHP), an organization we are members of, continues to do great work in the community every day. Demand for SHP services is increasing, and SHP has been able to serve a growing clientele in its emergency food, GED, homelessness, economic development, and immigration advocacy programs without increasing its budget. SHP's growth over the past eighteen months has really been rather amazing given the fact that it has not had any more resources to work with.

SHP currently has a problem, which we hope will be temporary. Due to uncertainty over funding authorizations at all levels of government, SHPs funding for the fall has actually declined and committed funds have been delayed. A handful of individuals have stepped into the breach with a commitment to match contributions that we can raise from SHP member congregations (Good Shepherd Lutheran, South Hayward United Methodist, Starr King Unitarian Universalist, St. Clemens Roman Catholic, United Church of Hayward, New Bridges Presbyterian, in addition to Shir Ami). These individuals will match up to \$2000 of contributions, so we are having a drive to try to raise \$2,000 from our congregations by October 15. If we can do it, the matches will turn our \$2,000 into \$4,000 which will be a big help to get through this very tough period.
